An act relating to public school attendance; creating s. 1003.215, F.S.; creating the Student Preparedness Pilot Program; requiring Duval County School District to review and identify curricula options for certain students; requiring students age 16 through age 18 in pilot program school districts who do not regularly attend school to be subject to specific attendance and completion requirements; providing for an application and selection process for school district participation in the pilot program in 2009-2010; requiring Legislative approval for pilot program districts; requiring receipt of a high school diploma, a high school equivalency diploma and ready to work certification, career or job training certification or licensure, or ready to work certification in order to terminate school enrollment between ages 16 and 18 years in a pilot program district; specifying school attendance requirements and procedures for

termination of school enrollment; requiring an annual study and reporting by the Office of Program Policy Analysis and Government Accountability; amending s. 1003.01, F.S., adding cross-references; adding a definition of regular school attendance in a pilot program district; amending s. 1003.21, F.S., requiring any student in a pilot program district to be informed of attendance requirements; amending s. 1004.99, F.S., providing for bronze, silver, and gold credential levels; requiring minimum scores on assessments for each credential level; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Section 1003.215, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

## 1003.215 Student Preparedness Pilot Program. --

that all students exit from the public schools with academic skills that provide the students with the opportunity to pursue postsecondary education or with skills that lead to ready to

The Legislature finds it to be in the public interest

work certification, industry certification, or skill licensure.

(2) Beginning with the 2008-2009 school year, and continuing through the 2014-2015 school year, there is created the Student Preparedness Pilot Program to be piloted by school districts.

(a) In the 2008-2009 school year, the Duval County School District shall review curricula options for students whose academic goals may not include a traditional high school diploma. The district school board shall identify options for these students and develop curricula to meet their needs prior to implementation in the 2009-2010 school year. These options

- shall include, but are not limited to, nontraditional academic options and flexible attendance options.
- (b) Beginning with the 2009-2010 school year, all students age 16 through age 18 who are enrolled in a pilot program school district and who choose to exercise their option not to regularly attend school pursuant to s. 1003.21(1)(c), shall be subject to the attendance and completion requirements of this section.
- application process for all school districts to apply to participate in the pilot program in the 2009-2010 school year.

  The State Board of Education shall select the pilot program school districts from the applications submitted, one of which shall be the Duval County School District. Pilot program school districts, in addition to the Duval County School District, shall be subject to Legislative approval during the 2009 Legislative Session.
- (4) Parents of public school students enrolled in a pilot program school district must receive accurate and timely information regarding their child's academic progress and must be informed of ways they can help their child to succeed in school.
- (a) A student who attains the age of 16 years during the school year has the right to file a formal declaration of intent to terminate school enrollment if the declaration is signed by the parent. The parent has the right to be notified by the school district of the district's receipt of the student's declaration of intent to terminate school enrollment. The student's guidance counselor or other school personnel must conduct an exit interview pursuant to s. 1003.21(1)(c). Any student who files a declaration seeking to terminate school enrollment but has not reached the age of 18 years shall be

required to continue pursuing credits toward a high school
diploma, pursue a high school equivalency diploma with
participation in the Florida Ready to Work Certification Program
under s. 1004.99, participate in a career or job training
program leading to industry certification or skill licensure
that is developed by or in cooperation with the district school
board, or participate in the Ready to Work Certification Program
under s. 1004.99 until completion or attainment of the age of 18
years.

- (b) A student who attains the age of 16, 17, or 18 years during the school year is not subject to compulsory school attendance beyond the date upon which he or she attains that age if the student files a formal declaration of intent to terminate school enrollment with the district school board and has received a high school diploma, has received a high school equivalency diploma and obtained a bronze or higher level Florida Ready to Work Credential under s. 1004.99, has obtained industry certification or skill licensure, or has obtained a Florida Ready to Work Credential under s. 1004.99.
- (c) Students who become or have become married or who are pregnant and parenting have the right to attend school and receive the same or equivalent educational instruction as other students.
- (5) The Office of Program Policy Analysis and Government Accountability (OPPAGA), in cooperation with the program school districts, the applicable state attorneys' offices and regional workforce boards, the Agency for Workforce Innovation, the Department of Education, and the Department of Juvenile Justice, shall conduct a study annually of the impact of the pilot program on dropout and graduation rates, on the employability of students, and on juvenile crime, using 2007-2008 data as the baseline for the research. OPPAGA shall develop criteria for

- collection and reporting of data with input from the cooperating 120 l entities. The results of each annual report shall be made 21 available to participating pilot program school districts, the 122 applicable state attorneys' offices and regional workforce 123 boards, the Agency for Workforce Education, the Department of 124 Education, the Department of Juvenile Justice, the Office of the 125 126 Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives by January 1 following each school 127 128 year, beginning January 1, 2012.   - "Habitual truant" means a student who has 15 unexcused absences within 90 calendar days with or without the knowledge or consent of the student's parent, is subject to compulsory school attendance under s. 1003.21(1) and (2)(a), and is not exempt under s. 1003.21(3) or s. 1003.24, is subject to the Student Preparedness Pilot Program under s. 1003.215, or by meeting the criteria for any other exemption specified by law or rules of the State Board of Education. Such a student must have been the subject of the activities specified in ss. 1003.26 and 1003.27(3), without resultant successful remediation of the truancy problem before being dealt with as a child in need of services according to the provisions of chapter 984.
  - (13) (a) "Regular school attendance" means the actual attendance of a student during the school day as defined by law and rules of the State Board of Education. Regular attendance within the intent of s. 1003.21 may be achieved by attendance in:
    - 1. (a) A public school supported by public funds;
    - 2. (b) A parochial, religious, or denominational school;

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- 3. (c) A private school supported in whole or in part by tuition charges or by endowments or gifts;
  - 4. (d) A home education program that meets the requirements of chapter 1002; or
  - 5. (e) A private tutoring program that meets the requirements of chapter 1002.
  - (b) "Regular program attendance" for a student in the
    Student Preparedness Pilot Program pursuant to s. 1003.215 means
    actual attendance by the student in traditional or
    nontraditional academic options as defined by law and rules of
    the State Board of Education. The district school

(c) A student who attains the age of 16 years during the school year is not subject to compulsory school attendance beyond the date upon which he or she attains that age if the student files a formal declaration of intent to terminate school enrollment with the district school board. Public school students who have attained the age of 16 years and who have not graduated are subject to compulsory school attendance until the formal declaration of intent is filed with the district school board. The declaration must acknowledge that terminating school enrollment is likely to reduce the student's earning potential and must be signed by the student and the student's parent. The school district must notify the student's parent of receipt of the student's declaration of intent to terminate school enrollment. The student's guidance counselor or other school personnel must conduct an exit interview with the student to

determine the reasons for the student's decision to terminate school enrollment and actions that could be taken to keep the student in school. The student must be informed of opportunities to continue his or her education in a different environment, including, but not limited to, adult education and GED test preparation. Additionally, the student must complete a survey in a format prescribed by the Department of Education to provide data on student reasons for terminating enrollment and actions taken by schools to keep students enrolled. A student enrolled in a Student Preparedness Pilot Program school district must receive information regarding the district's compulsory school attendance and completion requirements under s. 1003.215. ## HB 985 Workplace Skills of Students by Rep. Nelson

The Foundation asks that you vote <u>YES</u> on HB 985 (as amended by Rep. Nelson) in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Competitiveness Committee meeting on Tuesday, March 18.

Florida Ready to Work provides job seekers with a credential that verifies their skill level to prospective employers. Any student or resident in Florida is eligible to participate in the program at no cost and is assessed in three critical skill areas: reading for information, applied mathematics, and locating information. Based on their minimum score is each area, a participant can earn a bronze, silver, or gold level credential.

Employers can immediately evaluate whether a job applicant has the right combination of skills based on their three scores on the Ready to Work credential. This saves employers valuable time and resources when screening candidates and provides more reliable authentication of workforce skills than a high school diploma.

Ready to Work is supported by Florida's business leaders, including the Florida Chamber of Commerce and Associated Industries of the Florida, and this bill expands the implementation of this successful program in three ways:



- Requiring students to earn a Ready to Work credential when they select a high school
  major in a career or technical area. For high school graduates who will immediately enter the
  workforce, Ready to Work's business-aligned credential provides additional validation of their
  readiness for job placement. This endorsement will help career-focused students get a great job
  that matches their specific skill set.
- Requiring students to earn a gold-level Ready to Work credential before receiving a Gold Seal Vocational Bright Futures Scholarship. Earning a gold-level Ready to Work credential will challenge students seeking a Gold Seal Scholarship to acquire necessary workplace skills as they continue their education.
- Requiring consistent, statewide implementation of the Ready to Work program by
  Workforce Florida, Inc. Employers throughout Florida will benefit from an applicant pool that
  can be efficiently screened based on the desired mastery level of relevant skills. When students
  and adults applying for a job all have a statewide, recognized credential, businesses will save
  significant costs in the interviewing and hiring process. In addition, participants who need
  improvement are able to receive free, self-paced instruction tailored to their specific deficiencies
  as a part of the Ready to Work program.

Your support of our legislative priorities will be reflected in the grade you earn on *Florida's Education Report Card* to be released following the 2008 Legislative Session.
