Health Care Services; Proposes creation of s. 28, Art. I of State Constitution to prohibit laws or rules from compelling any person, employer, or health care provider to participate in any health care system, permit person or employer to purchase lawful health care services directly from health care provider, permit health care provider to accept direct payment from person or employer for lawful health care services, exempt persons, employers, & health care providers from penalties & fines for paying or accepting direct payment for lawful health care services, & permit purchase or sale of health insurance in private health care systems; specifies what amendment does not affect or prohibit.

HB 3 by Nehr

Assault or Battery of Law Enforcement Officers; Requires issuance of specified alert following attack upon law enforcement officer in certain circumstances. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 5 by Gibbons

Health Insurance; Requires individual accident or health insurance policies, group, blanket, or franchise accident or health insurance policies, & health maintenance contracts to provide specified coverage for orthoses, prostheses, orthotics, & prosthetics benefits; specifies deductible & copayment requirements; authorizes insurers & HMO's to specify benefits limitations; provides for nonapplication to specified policy & contract coverages. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 7 by Chestnut

Florida College System Institution Student Fees; Authorizes Florida College System institution boards of trustees to establish transportation access fee; limits amount of fee; provides timeframe for fee increase & implementation of increase; prohibits inclusion of fee in calculating amount student receives under Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program awards. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HM 9 by Rouson, Kriseman

Supporting the Marketing of Florida Seafood; Urges Congress to support marketing of Florida seafood.

HB 11 by Steinberg (Similar SB 238)

Child-restraint Requirements; Provides child-restraint requirements for certain children ages 4 through 7; provides certain exceptions; redefines term "motor vehicle" to exclude certain vehicles from such requirements; provides grace period. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 13 by Coley, Adkins, Ahern, Albritton, Broxson, Corcoran, Crisafulli, Drake, Ford, Gaetz, Hudson, Plakon, Smith (Similar SB 82, SB 168, Identical SB 130)

Onsite Sewage Treatment and Disposal Systems; Revises legislative intent; eliminates provisions directing DOH to create & administer statewide septic tank evaluation program; eliminates procedures & criteria for evaluation program; terminates grant program for repair of onsite sewage treatment disposal systems identified pursuant to evaluation program, to conform; eliminates provisions authorizing DOH to collect evaluation report fee & provisions relating to disposition of fee proceeds & revenue-neutral fee schedule. Effective Date: upon becoming a law

HB 15 by Soto

Assault or Battery on Utility Workers; Provides for reclassification of certain offenses against utility workers; reenacts specified provisions. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 17 by Nelson (Identical SB 138)

Military Veterans Convicted of Criminal Offenses; Provides that persons convicted of criminal offenses who allege that offenses resulted from posttraumatic stress disorder, substance abuse, or psychological problems stemming from service in combat theater in US military may have hearing on that issue prior to sentencing; provides that defendants found to have committed their offenses due to such causes & who are otherwise eligible for probation or community control may be placed in treatment programs for equal period of time in certain circumstances; provides for sentence credit; provides preference for treatment programs with histories of success. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 19 by Mayfield

Compensation of County Officials; Authorizes each county commissioner, circuit court clerk, county comptroller, sheriff, supervisor of elections, property appraiser, & tax collector to reduce his or her salary on voluntary basis. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 21 by Porth (Identical SB 180)

Health Insurance; Requires all antiretroviral agents to be included on health plan formularies; prohibits access-limiting procedures used to restrict antiretroviral agents prescribed to treat persons with HIV; includes reference to such requirements on policies issued by out-of-state groups. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 23 by Crisafulli (Identical SB 46)

Relief/William Dillon/State of Florida; Provides for relief of William Dillon, who was wrongfully incarcerated for 27 years & exonerated by court after DNA testing; provides appropriation to

compensate Mr. Dillon for his wrongful incarceration; directs CFO to draw warrant for purchase of annuity; provides for waiver of certain tuition & fees; provides conditions for payment; provides that act does not waive certain defenses or increase state's liability; provides limitation on payment of fees & costs; provides that certain benefits are void upon a finding that Mr. Dillon is not innocent of the alleged crime. Effective Date: upon becoming a law

HB 25 by Schwartz (Identical SB 96)

Mammogram Reports; Requires that all mammography reports include information & notice about breast density. Effective Date: October 1, 2011

HB 27 by Jenne (Identical SB 254)

Educational Plant Surveys; Authorizes extension to school district educational plant survey submission deadline; provides restrictions; provides requirements for submission of request for extension to DOE & requires department approval; provides restrictions on school district construction during extension period. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 29 by Weinstein, Porth (Identical SB 160)

Parole for Juvenile Offenders; Designates act "Graham Compliance Act"; provides that juvenile offender who was less than 18 years of age at time of commission of nonhomicide offense & who is sentenced to life imprisonment is eligible for parole if offender has been incarcerated for minimum period; requires initial eligibility interview to determine whether offender has demonstrated maturity & reform for parole; provides criteria to determine maturity & reform; provides eligibility for reinterview after specified period for offender denied parole. Effective Date: upon becoming a law

HB 31 by O'Toole (Identical SB 102)

Office of Chief Technology Officer; Creates Office of Chief Technology Officer within DFS; requires that Chief Technology Officer be appointed by Governor & Cabinet; requires that office be composed of three divisions; provides duties of such divisions; requires that Chief Technology Officer develop multiyear plan of action for purpose of meeting specified objectives. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 33 by Clarke-Reed

Allocation and Expenditure of State Lottery Revenues;

Requires portion of Powerball net revenues to be allocated to voluntary prekindergarten education programs; provides for use of funds. Effective Date: October 1, 2011

HB 35 by Ford (Similar SB 84)

Florida College System Institutions; Renames Pensacola Junior College as "Pensacola State College" & St. Johns River Community College as "St. Johns River State College." Effective Date: upon becoming a law

HB 37 by Rogers

Transportation Funding; Increases percentage of state revenues deposited into State Transportation Trust Fund to be committed by DOT for public transportation projects; directs portion of those revenues to be used for public transit pursuant to specified provisions. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 39 by Adkins, **Rouson** (Identical SB 204, Compare SB 336)

Controlled Substances; Defines term "homologue" for purposes of Florida Comprehensive Drug Abuse Prevention & Control Act; includes certain hallucinogenic substances on list of controlled substances in Schedule I; reenacts provisions to incorporate amendment. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 41 by Schwartz (Identical SB 182)

Primary Sponsors of Legislation; Permits naming of House & Senate primary sponsors of legislation in short title of bill & its companion when agreed to by primary sponsors of bill & companion. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 43 by Smith, Gaetz (Identical SB 88)

Public Officers; Prohibits severance pay for nonelected public officers except under specified circumstances; prohibits certain limitations on discussing employment dispute or settlement. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 45 by Gaetz, Ahern, Nehr, O'Toole, Smith

Regulation of Firearms and Ammunition; Prohibits specified persons & entities, when acting in official capacity, from knowingly & willfully regulating or attempting to regulate firearms or ammunition in any manner except as specifically authorized by s. 790.033, F.S., or other general law; provides penalty; eliminates authority of counties to adopt ordinance requiring waiting period between purchase & delivery of handgun; provides that no public funds shall be used to defend unlawful conduct of any person charged with violation of section; provides fines for governmental entities in whose service or employ provisions of section are knowingly & willfully violated; provides for investigation of complaints of criminal violations & prosecution of violators by state attorney; provides exceptions to prohibitions; provides conditional effective date. Effective Date: upon becoming a law

HJR 47 by Porth (Identical SJR 140)

Judicial Qualifications; Amends s. 8, Art. V of State Constitution to increase amount of time from 5 to 10 years that person must be member of Florida Bar before becoming eligible for office of circuit court or county court judge.

HB 49 by Fresen

Massage Therapy; Authorizes Board of Massage Therapy to issue temporary permits to applicants who meet certain qualifications to practice massage therapy; provides for

expiration of temporary permits; provides limitations; provides for temporary permit fee. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HJR 51 by Porth

Voting Rights of Felons; Proposes amendment to s. 4, Art. VI of State Constitution to disqualify person who is convicted of felony from voting only until completion of all sentences imposed & expiration or completion of all conditions of supervision, if any.

HB 53 by Nehr (Identical SB 24)

Relief/Kamel & Dimitri/Palm Beach Co. School Board;

Provides for relief of Ashraf Kamel & Marguerite Dimitri by Palm Beach County School Board; provides for appropriation to compensate them for wrongful death of their minor child, Jean A. Pierre Kamel, as result of negligence of school board; provides limitation on payment of fees & costs. Effective Date: upon becoming a law

HB 55 by Bullard (Identical SB 318)

Postsecondary Student Fees; Provides exemption from payment of nonresident tuition at state university or Florida College System institution for undocumented student who meets specified requirements; requires Board of Governors of State University System to adopt regulations & State Board of Education to adopt rules. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 57 by Grimsley (Identical SB 42)

Relief/Eric Brody/Broward County Sheriff's Office; Provides for relief of Eric Brody by Broward County Sheriff's Office; provides for appropriation to compensate him for injuries sustained as result of negligence of BCSO; authorizes Sheriff of Broward County, in lieu of payment, to execute to Eric Brody & his legal guardians assignment of all claims that BCSO has against its insurer arising out of insurer's handling of claim against BCSO; clarifies that such assignment does not impair ability or right of assignees to pursue final judgment & cost judgment against insurer; provides limitation on payment of fees & costs related to claim against BCSO & exception to that limitation as to any assigned claims brought against insurer. Effective Date: upon becoming a law

Withdrawn prior to introduction

HB 59 by Julien (Identical SB 328)

Service of Process; Specifies where process server must record certain information concerning service; grants authorized process servers unannounced access to specified residential areas where defendant or witness resides or is known to be. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 61 by Rogers (Similar SB 228)

Code of Student Conduct; Requires each district school board code of student conduct to include explanation of student responsibilities with regard to appropriate student dress; requires

each district school board to adopt dress code policy that prohibits student from wearing clothing that exposes underwear or body parts in specified manner; provides disciplinary actions for violation of dress code; requires adherence to code of student conduct for participation in extracurricular activities. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 63 by Crisafulli, Horner

Handbill Distribution; Designates act "Tourist Safety Act of 2011"; provides additional penalties for offense of unlawfully distributing handbills in public lodging establishment; specifies that certain items used in committing such offense are subject to seizure & forfeiture under Florida Contraband Forfeiture Act; authorizes law enforcement officer to arrest person without warrant when there is probable cause to believe person unlawfully distributed handbills in public lodging establishment & owner or manager of establishment signs affidavit containing certain information; provides that act does not affect or impede provisions of specified state statute or any protection or right guaranteed by Second Amendment to U.S. Constitution. Effective Date: October 1, 2011

HB 65 by Wood (Identical SB 298)

Municipal Governing Body Meetings; Authorizes governing bodies of certain municipalities to hold meetings within specified boundaries. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 67 by Bullard (Identical SB 150)

Career and Education Planning; Revises general requirements for middle grades promotion to require that course in career & education planning explore National Career Clusters; deletes DOE requirement relating to course. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 69 by Bullard (Compare HB 71, SB 258)

Student Assessment in the Public Schools; Terminates administration of FCAT to students in grades 9 through 12; requires PSAT/NMSQT or ACT's EXPLORE & PLAN tests to replace grade 10 FCAT for purposes of measuring student's knowledge & skills; requires students to take PSAT/NMSQT in grade 10 or ACT's EXPLORE & PLAN tests in grades 9 & 10, respectively, & earn passing scores to qualify for standard high school diploma; requires State Board of Education to designate passing scores; requires use of student performance on tests for school grading purposes; provides for application beginning with students entering grade 9 in 2012-2013 school year. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 71 by Campbell (Compare HB 69, SB 258)

Student Assessment in the Public Schools; Provides that FCAT shall be discontinued & shall not be administered to public school students; requires High School Competency Test (HSCT) to replace grade 10 FCAT; requires student to earn passing scores on HSTC to qualify for standard high school diploma; requires State Board of Education to designate passing scores; provides for implementation beginning with 2013-2014 school year. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HJR 73 by Ahern, Corcoran

Death Penalty Cases; Proposes creation of s. 22, Art. III of State Constitution to require Legislature by general law to adopt rules governing time limits, procedures, & processes relating to all death penalty cases & related proceedings in all courts.

Withdrawn prior to introduction

HB 75 by Abruzzo

Sexting; Provides that minor commits offense of sexting if he or she knowingly uses computer or other device to transmit or distribute photograph or video of himself or herself which depicts nudity & is harmful to minors, or knowingly possesses such photograph or video that was transmitted or distributed to minor from another minor; provides that transmission or distribution of multiple photographs or videos is single offense if such photographs & videos were transmitted or distributed in same 24-hour period; provides that possession of multiple photographs or videos that were transmitted or distributed by minor is single offense if such photographs & videos were transmitted or distributed by minor in same 24-hour period; provides that act does not prohibit prosecution of minor for conduct relating to material that includes depiction of sexual conduct or sexual excitement or for stalking. Effective Date: October 1, 2011

HB 77 by Abruzzo

Internet Poker; Creates "Internet Poker Consumer Protection & Revenue Generation Act of 2011"; provides for intrastate Internet poker to be provided to public by cardroom operators through state Internet poker network operated by Internet poker hub operators; provides for licensure, administration, & regulation by Division of Pari-mutuel Wagering of DBPR. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 79 by Porth, Berman, Julien (Similar SB 158)

Use of Wireless Communications Devices While Driving; Creates "Florida Ban on Texting While Driving Law"; prohibits operation of motor vehicle while using wireless communications device; provides for enforcement as secondary action; provides for assessment of points against driver's license for unlawful use

of wireless communications device resulting in crash. Effective

Date: October 1, 2011

HB 81 by Rouson

Treatment-based Drug Court Programs; Provides that court has discretion to allow offenders with prior violent felony offenses into postadjudicatory treatment-based drug court programs on case-by-case basis; requires all offenders sentenced to postadjudicatory drug court program who are drug court participants who are subject of violation of probation or community control hearing under specified provisions to have violation of probation or community control heard by judge presiding over drug court program; increases number of Criminal Punishment Code scoresheet total sentence points that defendant may have & be eligible for postadjudicatory treatment-based drug court program; makes defendants other

than those who have violated probation or community control by failed or suspect substance abuse test eligible for postadjudicatory treatment-based drug court programs. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 83 by Soto

Autism; Creates Autism Spectrum Disorder Study Committee to study autism spectrum disorder in families in which English is second language; provides for membership, meetings, & duties; prohibits members from receiving compensation; authorizes certain funding for publications, subject to approval of State Surgeon General; requires report to Governor & Legislature; provides for expiration of committee. Effective Date: upon becoming a law

HB 85 by Soto

County and Municipal Detention Facilities; Requires each county or municipal detention facility to receive periodic state certification from DOC; provides for remedial measures for violations; authorizes rulemaking; makes editorial revisions. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 87 by Soto

Judicial Opinions; Designates act "Judicial Opinion Communications Act"; provides intent; requires that opinion of Supreme Court or district court of appeal that has any of certain specified holdings be provided to specified offices in other branches of government; requires offices receiving opinion to acknowledge receipt within specified period; allows acknowledgment to include statement of action to be taken in response. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 89 by Workman, Gaetz

Effective Public Notices by Governmental Entities:

Authorizes local government to use its publicly accessible website for legally required notices & advertisements; defines "publicly accessible website"; provides conditions for utilization of publicly accessible website for such purposes; provides for optional receipt of legally required public notices & advertisements via first class mail or e-mail; provides requirements for legally required advertisements & public notices published on publicly accessible website; provides that specified notice, advertisement, or publication on publicly accessible website constitutes legal notice; provides that advertisements directed by law or order or decree of court to be made in county in which no newspaper is published may be made by publication on publicly accessible website; provides clarifying & conforming language. Effective Date: October 1, 2011

HB 91 by Bernard

Drug-related Overdoses; Designates act "911 Good Samaritan Act"; provides that person acting in good faith who seeks medical assistance for someone experiencing drug-related overdose may not be charged with specified offenses; provides that person who experiences drug-related overdose & needs medical assistance may not be charged for specified offenses if

evidence was obtained as result of overdose & need for assistance; provides that protections from prosecution are not grounds for suppression of evidence in other prosecutions; provides that departure from lowest permissible criminal sentence is permitted when defendant was making good faith effort to obtain or provide medical assistance for someone experiencing drug-related overdose. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 93 by Steube (Identical SB 172)

Security Cameras; Reenacts provisions relating to prohibited standards for security cameras; provides for retroactive operation of act; provides exception under specified circumstances. Effective Date: upon becoming a law, and shall operate retroactively to June 1, 2009. If such retroactive application is held by a court of last resort to be unconstitutional, this act shall apply prospectively from the date that this act becomes a law

HB 95 by Bembry (Identical SB 236)

State Parks; Provides for parents of certain deceased veterans to receive lifetime annual entrance passes to state parks at no charge. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 97 by Gaetz, Ahern, Horner

Health Insurance; Prohibits use of state or federal funds to provide coverage for abortions in exchange created pursuant to federal law; specifies conditions under which health insurance policy, group health insurance policy, or health maintenance contract is deemed to be purchased with state or federal funds. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 99 by Drake (Similar SB 178)

Commercial Insurance Rates; Exempts additional classes of commercial insurance & all commercial motor vehicle insurance from being subject to otherwise applicable rate filing requirements; removes requirements that insurer rate change notices for exempt classes & commercial motor vehicle insurance include certain types of records & information; requires insurers of exempt classes of insurance & insurance rating organizations to retain certain actuarial data related to rate changes for time certain; deletes authority for OIR to require all information necessary to evaluate rate changes for exempt classes of insurance. Effective Date: October 1, 2011

HB 101 by Cruz (Identical SB 240)

Violations of Injunctions for Protection; Adds circumstances that violate injunction for protection against repeat violence, sexual violence, or dating violence. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 103 by Diaz

State Lotteries; Requires retailer of lottery tickets to provide assistance to individual who is blind or visually impaired & has requested assistance in filling out his or her lottery ticket; provides that retailer or employee of retailer is not liable under certain circumstances. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 105 by Goodson

Open House Parties; Provides that person who violates open house party statute second or subsequent time commits misdemeanor of first degree; provides that person commits misdemeanor of first degree if violation of open house party statute causes serious bodily injury or death of minor. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 107 by Smith (Identical SB 224)

Local Government Accountability; Revises provisions relating to procedures for declaring special districts inactive; specifies level of detail required for local governmental entity's proposed budget; revises provisions for local governmental entity's audit & annual financial reports; requires local governmental entity's budget to be posted online; revises budgetary guidelines for district school boards. Effective Date: October 1, 2011

HB 109 by Nelson

Public School Buses; Provides for district school board policies that authorize commercial advertisements on school buses; provides policy requirements relating to reimbursement to school district, prohibited advertisements, & signage & equipment standards; requires school bus to be withdrawn from use under certain circumstances; provides indemnification from liability; provides for remittance & allocation of revenue. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 111 by Thompson, G. (Identical SB 272)

Cadmium in Children's Products; Prohibits person from using or applying cadmium in excess of specified amount on any item of children's jewelry, toy, or child care article sold in this state; provides exception; provides criminal penalty. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HJR 113 by Kriseman (Similar SJR 300)

Term Limits; Proposes amendment to s. 15, Art. III & s. 4, Art VI & creation of provision in Art. XII of State Constitution to increase length of terms of state senators to 6 years & state representatives to 4 years & limit state senators, state representatives, & elected county & municipal officers to 12 consecutive years in office.

Withdrawn prior to introduction

HB 115 by Adkins

Creation of the Department of Health and Human Services; Creates Department of Health & Human Services (DHHS); provides for appointment of Secretary of Health & Human Services by Governor; provides guidelines for procurement of health services; establishes Central Office of Investigative Services & Office of Inspector General; directs Board of Governors to establish regional policy development & research exchange centers at specified state universities for certain purposes; repeals provisions relating to DCFS, AHCA, DOH, & related trust funds; provides for transfer of related functions &

responsibilities to DHHS. Effective Date: July 1, 2011

HB 117 by Crisafulli

Homestead Property Assessments; Provides additional limitations on annual changes in assessments of homestead real property. Effective Date: January 1, 2012

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
