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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Subsection (5) of section 97.052, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

97.052 Uniform statewide voter registration application. --

- (5) The voter registration application form prescribed by the Election Assistance Commission pursuant to federal law, or the federal postcard application, or the federal write-in absentee ballot must be accepted as an application for registration in this state if the completed application, federal or postcard application, or federal write-in absentee ballot contains the information required by the constitution and laws of this state.
- Section 2. Subsection (7) of section 101.6103, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:
 - 101.6103 Mail ballot election procedure. --
- vote in the election, the supervisor of elections shall mail an official ballot with a secrecy envelope, a return mailing envelope, and instructions sufficient to describe the voting process to each such elector on a date sufficient to allow such elector time to vote in the election and to have his or her marked ballot reach the supervisor by 7 p.m. on the day of the election. However, a ballot cast by an overseas voter shall be counted if the ballot is received within 10 days after the date of the election, is postmarked or signed and dated no later than the date of the election, and is legal.

Section 3. Section 101.65, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

101.65 Instructions to absent electors.—The supervisor shall enclose with each absentee ballot separate printed instructions in substantially the following form:

READ THESE INSTRUCTIONS CAREFULLY BEFORE MARKING BALLOT.

- 1. VERY IMPORTANT. In order to ensure that your absentee ballot will be counted, it should be completed and returned as soon as possible so that it can reach the supervisor of elections of the county in which your precinct is located no later than 7 p.m. on the day of the election.
- 2. Mark your ballot in secret as instructed on the ballot. You must mark your own ballot unless you are unable to do so because of blindness, disability, or inability to read or write.
- 3. Mark only the number of candidates or issue choices for a race as indicated on the ballot. If you are allowed to "Vote for One" candidate and you vote for more than one candidate, your vote in that race will not be counted.
- 4. Place your marked ballot in the enclosed secrecy envelope.
- 5. Insert the secrecy envelope into the enclosed mailing envelope which is addressed to the supervisor.
- 6. Seal the mailing envelope and completely fill out the Voter's Certificate on the back of the mailing envelope.
- 7. VERY IMPORTANT. In order for your absentee ballot to be counted, you must sign your name on the line above (Voter's Signature).

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8. VERY IMPORTANT. If you are an overseas voter, you must include the date you signed the Voter's Certificate on the line above (Date) or your ballot may not be counted. An absentee ballot cast by an overseas voter shall be counted if the ballot is received within 10 days after the date of the election, is postmarked or signed and dated no later than the date of the election, and is legal.

- 9. Mail, deliver, or have delivered the completed mailing envelope. Be sure there is sufficient postage if mailed.
- 10. FELONY NOTICE. It is a felony under Florida law to accept any gift, payment, or gratuity in exchange for your vote for a candidate. It is also a felony under Florida law to vote in an election using a false identity or false address, or under any other circumstances making your ballot false or fraudulent.
- Section 4. Section 101.67, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:
- 101.67 Safekeeping of mailed ballots; deadline for receiving absentee ballots.--
- (1) The supervisor of elections shall safely keep in his or her office any envelopes received containing marked ballots of absent electors, and he or she shall, before the canvassing of the election returns, deliver the envelopes to the county canvassing board along with his or her file or list kept regarding such said ballots.
- (2) Except as otherwise provided in s. 101.6956, all marked absent electors' ballots to be counted must be received by the supervisor by 7 p.m. the day of the election. All ballots received after the applicable deadline thereafter shall be

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marked with the time and date of receipt and filed in the supervisor's office.

- Section 5. Subsection (2) of section 101.6923, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:
- 101.6923 Special absentee ballot instructions for certain first-time voters.--
- (2) A voter covered by this section shall be provided with printed instructions with his or her absentee ballot in substantially the following form:

READ THESE INSTRUCTIONS CAREFULLY BEFORE MARKING YOUR BALLOT.

124 FAILURE TO FOLLOW THESE INSTRUCTIONS MAY CAUSE YOUR BALLOT NOT

125 TO COUNT.

- 1. In order to ensure that your absentee ballot will be counted, it should be completed and returned as soon as possible so that it can reach the supervisor of elections of the county in which your precinct is located no later than 7 p.m. on the date of the election.
- 2. Mark your ballot in secret as instructed on the ballot. You must mark your own ballot unless you are unable to do so because of blindness, disability, or inability to read or write.
- 3. Mark only the number of candidates or issue choices for a race as indicated on the ballot. If you are allowed to "Vote for One" candidate and you vote for more than one, your vote in that race will not be counted.
- 4. Place your marked ballot in the enclosed secrecy envelope and seal the envelope.

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5. Insert the secrecy envelope into the enclosed envelope bearing the Voter's Certificate. Seal the envelope and completely fill out the Voter's Certificate on the back of the envelope.

a. You must sign your name on the line above (Voter's Signature).

- b. If you are an overseas voter, you must include the date you signed the Voter's Certificate on the line above (Date) or your ballot may not be counted. An absentee ballot cast by an overseas voter shall be counted if the ballot is received within 10 days after the date of the election, is postmarked or signed and dated no later than the date of the election, and is legal.
- 6. Unless you meet one of the exemptions in Item 7., you must make a copy of one of the following forms of identification:
- a. Identification which must include your name and photograph: United States passport; debit or credit card; military identification; student identification; retirement center identification; neighborhood association identification; or public assistance identification; or
- b. Identification which shows your name and current residence address: current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck, or government document (excluding voter identification card).
- 7. The identification requirements of Item 6. do not apply if you meet one of the following requirements:
 - a. You are 65 years of age or older.
 - b. You have a temporary or permanent physical disability.

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c. You are a member of a uniformed service on active duty who, by reason of such active duty, will be absent from the county on election day.

- d. You are a member of the Merchant Marine who, by reason of service in the Merchant Marine, will be absent from the county on election day.
- e. You are the spouse or dependent of a member referred to in paragraph c. or paragraph d. who, by reason of the active duty or service of the member, will be absent from the county on election day.
 - f. You are currently residing outside the United States.
- 8. Place the envelope bearing the Voter's Certificate into the mailing envelope addressed to the supervisor. Insert a copy of your identification in the mailing envelope. DO NOT PUT YOUR IDENTIFICATION INSIDE THE SECRECY ENVELOPE WITH THE BALLOT OR INSIDE THE ENVELOPE WHICH BEARS THE VOTER'S CERTIFICATE OR YOUR BALLOT WILL NOT COUNT.
- 9. Mail, deliver, or have delivered the completed mailing envelope. Be sure there is sufficient postage if mailed.
- 10. FELONY NOTICE. It is a felony under Florida law to accept any gift, payment, or gratuity in exchange for your vote for a candidate.  - 101.6925 Canvassing special absentee ballots.--

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- If the identification is not enclosed in the mailing envelope and the voter has not indicated that he or she is exempt from the identification requirements, the supervisor shall check the voter registration records to determine if the voter's identification was previously received or the voter had previously notified the supervisor that he or she was exempt. The envelope with the Voter's Certificate shall not be opened unless the identification has been received or the voter has indicated that he or she is exempt. The ballot shall be treated as a provisional ballot until 7 p.m. on election day and shall not be canvassed unless the supervisor has received the required identification or written indication of exemption by 7 p.m. on election day. However, an absentee ballot cast by an overseas voter shall be counted if the ballot is received within 10 days after the date of the election, is postmarked or signed and dated no later than the date of the election, and is legal.
- Section 7. Section 101.694, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:
- 101.694 Mailing <u>or processing</u> of <u>absentee</u> ballots upon receipt of federal postcard application <u>or federal write-in</u> <u>absentee ballot.--</u>
- (1) Upon receipt of a federal postcard application for an absentee ballot executed by a person whose registration is in order or whose application is sufficient to register or update the registration of that person, the supervisor shall mail to the applicant a ballot, if the ballots are available for mailing. The federal postcard application request for an

absentee ballot shall be effective for all elections through the next two regularly scheduled general elections.

- executed by a person whose registration is in order or whose information on the form is sufficient to register or update the registration of that person, the supervisor shall consider the ballot as an absentee ballot request and, if voted, process the ballot pursuant to s. 101.67(1). If the federal write-in absentee ballot received isn't voted, the supervisor shall mail to the applicant an absentee ballot, if the ballots are available for mailing.
- (3)(2) Upon receipt of a federal postcard application for an absentee ballot or a federal write-in absentee ballot executed by a person whose registration is not in order and whose application is insufficient to register or update the registration of that person, the supervisor shall follow the procedure set forth in s. 97.073.
- (4)(3) Absentee envelopes printed for voters entitled to vote absentee under the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act shall meet the specifications as determined by the Federal Voting Assistance Program of the United States Department of Defense and the United States Postal Service.
- (5)(4) Cognizance shall be taken of the fact that absentee ballots and other materials such as instructions and envelopes are to be carried via air mail, and, to the maximum extent possible, such ballots and materials shall be reduced in size and weight of paper. The same ballot shall be used, however, as is used by other absentee voters.

Section 8. Section 101.6952, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

101.6952 Absentee ballots for overseas voters.--

- (1) If an overseas voter's request for an absentee ballot includes an e-mail address, the supervisor of elections shall inform the voter of the names of candidates who will be on the ballots via electronic transmission. The supervisor of elections shall e-mail to the voter the list of candidates for the primary and general election not later than 30 days before each election.
- (2) A voter entitled to vote absentee under the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act may use the federal write-in absentee ballot in any federal, state, or local election for which the voter is entitled to vote.
- (3)(2) For absentee ballots received from overseas voters, there is a presumption that the envelope was mailed on the date stated on the outside of the return envelope, regardless of the absence of a postmark on the mailed envelope or the existence of a postmark date that is later than the date of the election.
- Section 9. Section 101.6956, Florida Statutes, is created to read:
- 101.6956 Receipt and counting of absentee ballots of overseas voters.—An absentee ballot cast by an overseas voter which is postmarked or signed and dated no later than the date of the applicable federal, state, or local election shall be counted if received within 10 days after the date of the election and legal.
