7 Section 1. Section 161.142, Florida Statutes, is amended
8 to read:

9 161.142 Declaration of public policy relating to improved
10 navigation inlets.--The Legislature hereby recognizes the need
11 for maintaining navigation inlets to promote commercial and
12 recreational uses of our coastal waters and their resources. The
13 Legislature further recognizes that inlets interrupt or alter
14 the natural drift of beach-quality sand resources, which often
15 results in these sand resources being deposited in nearshore
16 around shallow outer bar areas or in the inlet channel instead
17 of providing natural nourishment to the adjacent eroding
18 down-drift beaches. Accordingly, the Legislature finds it is in
19 the public interest to replicate the natural drift of sand which
20 is interrupted or altered by inlets to be replaced and for each
21 level of government to undertake all reasonable efforts to

22 maximize inlet sand bypassing to ensure that beach-quality sand
23 is placed on adjacent eroding beaches. Such activities cannot
24 make up for the historical sand deficits caused by inlets but
25 shall be designed to balance the sediment budget of the inlet
26 and adjacent beaches and extend the life of proximate beach-
27 restoration projects so that periodic nourishment is needed less
28 frequently. Therefore, in furtherance of this declaration of
29 public policy and the Legislature's intent to redirect and
30 recommit the state's comprehensive beach management efforts to
31 address the beach erosion caused by inlets, the department shall
32 ensure that:

33 (1) All construction and maintenance dredgings of beach-
34 quality sand are ~~should be~~ placed on the adjacent eroding
35 ~~downdrift~~ beaches unless, ~~or~~, if placed elsewhere, an equivalent
36 quality and quantity of sand from an alternate location is
37 ~~should be~~ placed on the adjacent eroding downdrift beaches.

38 (2) On an average annual basis, a quantity of beach-
39 quality sand is ~~should be~~ placed on the adjacent eroding
40 ~~downdrift~~ beaches which is equal to the natural net annual
41 longshore sediment transport. The department shall, with the
42 assistance of university-based or other contractual resources
43 that it may employ or call upon, maintain a current estimate of
44 such quantities of sand for purposes of prioritizing, planning,
45 and permitting.

46 (3) Construction waterward of the coastal construction
47 control line on downdrift coastal areas, on islands
48 substantially created by the deposit of spoil, located within 1
49 mile of the centerline of navigation channels or inlets,
50 providing access to ports listed in s. 403.021(9)(b), which
51 suffers or has suffered erosion caused by such navigation

52 channel maintenance or construction shall be exempt from the
53 permitting requirements and prohibitions of subsections ~~(2),~~
54 (5), and (6) of s. 161.053-, however, such construction shall
55 comply with the applicable Florida Building Code adopted
56 pursuant to s. 553.73. The timing and sequence of any
57 construction activities associated with inlet management
58 projects in such coastal areas shall comply with 44 C.F.R. part
59 60 and shall provide protection to nesting sea turtles and their
60 hatchlings and their habitats, to nesting shorebirds, and to
61 native salt-resistant vegetation and endangered plant
62 communities. Beach-quality sand placed on the beach as part of
63 an inlet management project must be suitable for marine turtle
64 nesting.

65 (4) The provisions of subsections (1) and (2) shall not be
66 a requirement imposed upon ports listed in s. 403.021(9)(b);
67 however, such ports must demonstrate reasonable effort to place
68 beach-quality sand from construction and maintenance dredging
69 and port-development projects on adjacent eroding beaches in
70 accordance with port master plans approved by the Department of
71 Community Affairs, and permits approved and issued by the
72 department, to ensure compliance with the provisions of this
73 section. Ports may sponsor or cosponsor inlet management
74 projects that are fully eligible for state cost sharing.

75 (5) The department shall ensure that any disposal of the
76 beach-quality sand from federal projects in this state which
77 involve dredging for the purpose of navigation is on, or in the
78 nearshore area of, adjacent eroding beaches. The department may
79 consider permitting nearshore or upland disposal of such beach-
80 quality sand if emergency conditions exist. The state recognizes
81 that due to the growing demand for beach-quality sand resources

82 for beach restoration and nourishment projects, the limited
83 supply of such sand resources, and the cost of such projects,
84 beach or nearshore sand placement is the least-cost disposal
85 method.

86 (6) If federal investigations and reports or state-
87 approved inlet management plans do not specify the entity or
88 entities responsible for the extent of erosion caused by an
89 inlet, the department or local government, with the assistance
90 of university-based or other contractual resources that they may
91 employ or call upon, is encouraged to undertake assessments that
92 aid in specifying the responsible entity or entities and in more
93 accurately determining cost-sharing responsibilities for
94 measures to correct such erosion. The entity that is responsible
95 for maintenance dredging of an inlet may be deemed responsible
96 for the erosion caused by the inlet if another responsible party
97 is not specified in such an assessment, a shore-protection
98 project investigation or report, or a state-approved inlet
99 management plan.

100 (7) If the beneficiaries of the inlet, the local
101 governments having jurisdiction of lands adjacent to the inlet,
102 or the owners of property adjacent to the inlet are involved in
103 a dispute concerning how much sand should be bypassed, the
104 department shall protect its monetary investment in beach
105 nourishment projects within the inlet's physical zone of
106 influence by taking all reasonable actions to balance the
107 sediment budget of the inlet and adjacent beaches, including
108 implementation of inlet sand bypassing and other inlet
109 management projects.

110 Section 2. Section 161.143, Florida Statutes, is created

112 161.143 Inlet management; planning, prioritizing, funding,
113 approving, and implementing projects.--

114 (1) Studies, projects, and activities for the purpose of
115 mitigating the erosive effects of inlets and balancing the
116 sediment budget of the inlet and adjacent beaches must be
117 supported by separately approved inlet management plans or inlet
118 components of the statewide comprehensive beach management plan.
119 Such plans in support of individual inlet projects or activities
120 must, pursuant to s. 161.161(1)(b), evaluate each inlet to
121 determine the extent of the inlet's erosive effect on adjacent
122 beaches and, if significant, make recommendations to mitigate
123 such ongoing erosive effects and provide estimated costs for
124 such mitigation.

125 (2) The department shall establish annual funding
126 priorities for studies, activities, or other projects concerning
127 inlet management. Such inlet management projects include, but
128 are not limited to, inlet sand bypassing, modifications to
129 channel dredging, jetty redesign, jetty repair, disposal of
130 spoil material, and the development, revision, adoption, or
131 implementation of an inlet management plan. The funding
132 priorities established by the department must be consistent with
133 the requirements and legislative declaration in ss. 161.101(14),
134 161.142, and 161.161(1)(b). In establishing funding priorities
135 under this subsection and before transmitting the annual inlet
136 project list to the Legislature under subsection (5), the
137 department shall seek formal input from local coastal
138 governments, beach and general government associations and other
139 coastal interest groups, and university experts concerning
140 annual funding priorities for inlet management projects. In
141 order to maximize the benefits of efforts to address the inlet-

142 caused beach erosion problems of this state, the ranking
143 criteria used by the department to establish funding priorities
144 for studies, activities, or other projects concerning inlet
145 management must include consideration of:

146 (a) An estimate of the annual quantity of beach-quality
147 sand reaching the updrift boundary of the improved jetty or
148 inlet channel.

149 (b) The severity of the erosion to the adjacent beaches
150 caused by the inlet and the extent to which the proposed project
151 mitigates the erosive effects of the inlet.

152 (c) The overall significance and anticipated success of
153 the proposed project in balancing the sediment budget of the
154 inlet and adjacent beaches and addressing the sand deficit along
155 the inlet-affected shorelines.

156 (d) The extent to which existing bypassing activities at
157 an inlet would benefit from modest, cost-effective improvements
158 when considering the volumetric increases from the proposed
159 project, the availability of beach-quality sand currently not
160 being bypassed to adjacent eroding beaches, and the ease with
161 which such beach-quality sand may be obtained.

162 (e) The interest and commitment of local governments as
163 demonstrated by their willingness to coordinate the planning,
164 design, construction, and maintenance of an inlet management
165 project and their financial plan for funding the local cost-
166 share for initial construction, ongoing sand bypassing, channel
167 dredging, and maintenance.

168 (f) The previous completion or approval of a state-
169 sponsored inlet management plan or local-government-sponsored
170 inlet study concerning the inlet addressed by the proposed
171 project, the ease of updating and revising any such plan or

172 study, and the adequacy and specificity of the plan's or study's
173 recommendations concerning the mitigation of an inlet's erosive

175 (g) The degree to which the proposed project will enhance
176 the performance and longevity of proximate beach nourishment
177 projects, thereby reducing the frequency of such periodic
178 nourishment projects.

179 (h) The project-ranking criteria in s. 161.101(14) to the
180 extent such criteria are applicable to inlet management studies,
181 projects, and activities.

182 (3) The department may, pursuant to s. 161.101 and
183 notwithstanding s. 161.101(15), pay from legislative
184 appropriations provided for these purposes 75 percent of the
185 total costs, or, if applicable, the nonfederal costs, of a
186 study, activity, or other project concerning the management of
187 an inlet. The balance must be paid by the local governments or
