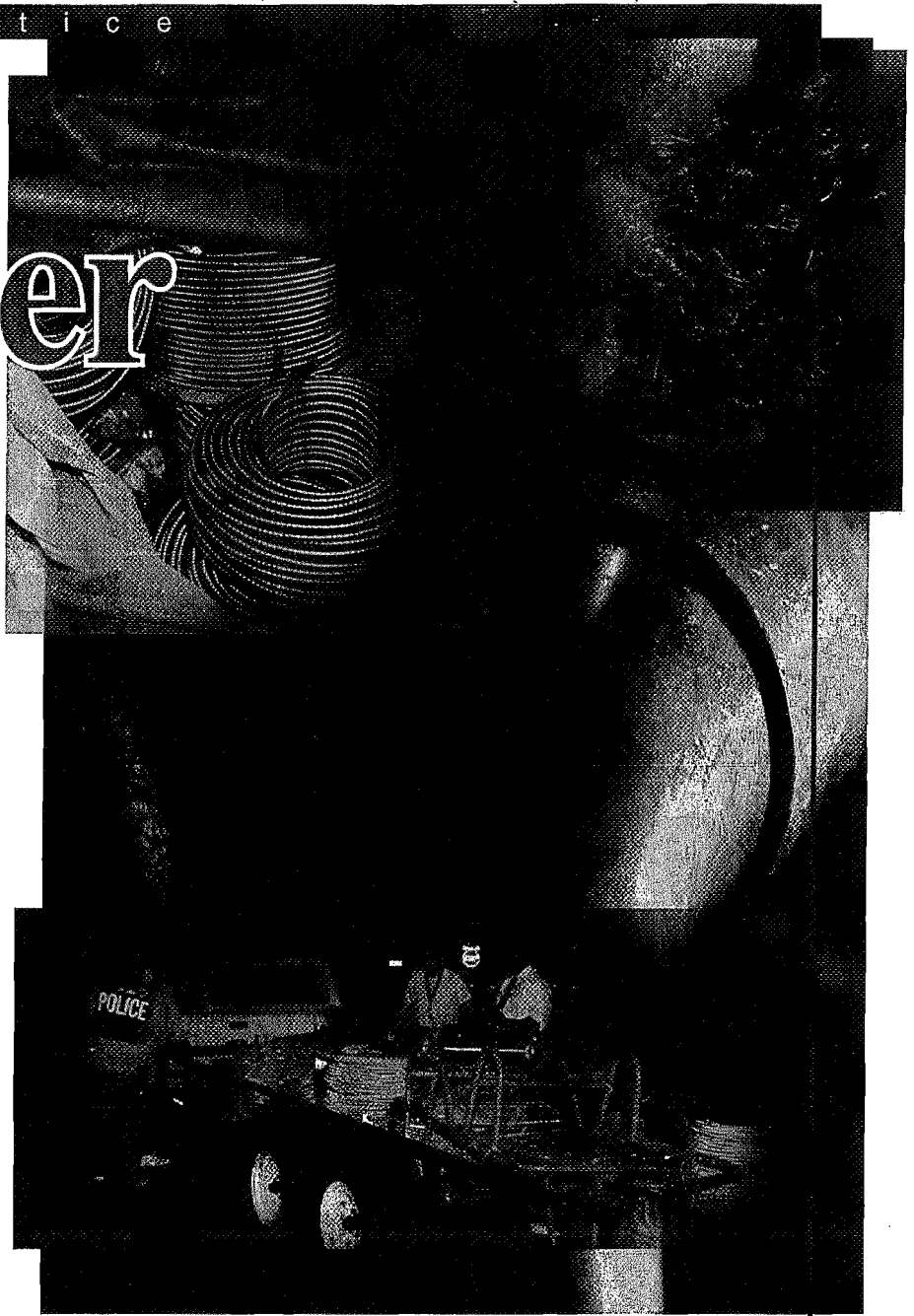

## The Metal Theft Epidemic

**A**ll across Florida, and the rest of the nation, residents and businesses are being targeted by a growing group of criminals ... metal thieves and resellers. Due to the increasing worldwide demand for metals, more and more criminals are stealing copper wiring from construction sites, digging up underground telecommunication wires, cutting utility wires and even stealing beer kegs!

Sought after metal can be found just about anywhere and most of it is unguarded. Homes, churches, businesses and industries like construction, telecommunications, utilities, agriculture and beer are being victimized every day. The metal demand in China and India has surged, causing prices everywhere to peak.

## Stolen Metal Sales on the Rise

Theft is just part of the problem. Unscrupulous metals dealers who are willing to resell the stolen property are adding to the demand and supporting criminal activity.

- Thieves can easily sell copper wire and other metals at scrap yards across the state for \$1.50 to \$3 a pound
- In three years, beer kegs scrap value has gone from \$5 per keg to over \$40 per keg
- Florida isn't alone – each year copper and other metal thefts amount to \$1 billion in the U.S.

## “Hot Wire” Crimes

- A school electrical supervisor allegedly stole \$271,000 worth of copper wiring from the Broward County School District
- The City of Orlando has had over 200 separate incidents of metal theft in the first 6 months of this year, the city anticipates close to 500 total thefts for the year
- Approximately \$200 in copper metal theft may cost a Seminole Heights church \$50,000 to repair
- Two suspects removed the ground wires on 177 transmission structures between Santa Rosa and Okaloosa Counties, jeopardizing the safety of dozens of employees, contractors and community members
- The local telecommunications company for Baker County had over 1600 feet of aerial cable stolen; replacement costs are close to \$27,000

## Metal Theft ... A Deadly Danger

Stealing wire from utility sites can cause power outages and surges or even worse. If phone wires are ripped from the ground, a person with an emergency may be unable to reach help. If utility wires are cut, electricity will not reach the home of an ill person who uses a medical device. Additionally, an innocent person may come into contact with equipment that has been damaged by metal thieves, potentially causing injury or death.

## Public Safety Legislation: *Saving Lives and Preventing Metal Theft*

Thirteen states now have laws to help stop secondary metal theft. In Florida, Rep. Baxter Troutman (HB 105), Rep. Scott Randolph (HB 113), Sen. Lee Constantine (SB 556) and Sen. Victor Crist (SB 748) have filed bills to help to deter this growing and costly problem.

This public safety legislation aims to crack down on theft by requiring secondary metal dealers to keep records including:

- Name and/or description of person from whom the goods were acquired
- Address and workplace
- Home and work phone numbers
- A thumbprint
- Vehicle information and photograph
- Videotape or digital image of the regulated metals being sold

These precautionary actions will help deter thieves from bringing stolen items to a legitimate secondary metal dealer. Those unscrupulous metal dealers who do not provide the required information and receive stolen property can be charged with a felony of the third degree!

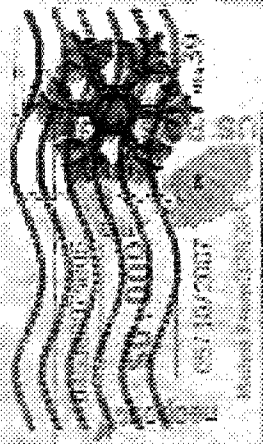

It has been nearly seventeen years since I last saw you in the Seminole County Courthouse I hope you are in Norway, I would like to hear from you after all these years. It's hard for me to know whether you have any animosity towards me for robbing your store, or not. It's been so long ago. I'm hoping that you don't

I can't remember for sure if I ever told you that I was sorry. If I didn't I'm telling you now that I am sorry. My decision to rob your store was the worst decision of my life, you're probably wondering why now and to be perfectly honest with you, the answer is that I don't want to die in prison. I am getting ready to ask the Governor for clemency, and as crazy as this may sound I'm, praying that you will help, and give me your blessings I'm telling you before I file the paper work. because I want you to hear about it from me first, and I would like you to have time to think about it before the Clemency Board contacts you. I'm really not sure what they're going to do, but I'm guessing some kind of crime advocate will be asking how you feel about me getting out.

I cashed out my life with my family so I was in prison.  
The other man in the store with me that day, Larry Evans, died  
six years ago in the State prison at Reiford. The third party  
that escaped any indictment in the robbery case of course  
less than three years after it was sentenced. I hope that  
settles any questions you may have had over the years.

The time I received for the robbery, and the theft was several

for half several years ago. But, the kidnapping that was added

to my charges by that Spanish politician man in behind the  
English hall. Mr. Daly did nothing as simply as I can for your  
forgiveness, and your help, I can never change what

happened in your store seventeen years ago if I could,

I would have done so long before now. I don't want you to

think that, the time I have spent in here is like some

years, you've seen on T.V. I have obtained many vocational and

some academic degrees to better my self so that I may

have a honest life. If God willing, I was fortunate enough

to gain my freedom again. Mr. Daly now did just a forty-five

year old man trying to salvage what's left of my life. I had a

wife, three small children when I pulled this. About seventeen


years ago. I destroyed their lives along with mine.

I have three grandsons now, and I just want to go back

home and be a grandpa and live out my days in

peace with your blessing, of course.

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**Reliving the trauma**

A letter from prison rekindles fear and anger in a crime victim.

**LONGWOOD** -- Even as he held the letter in his hand, Jim Daly couldn't figure out why he was getting mail from a Florida prison. The name on the envelope didn't register.

But the opening words quickly brought back the terror that he has suppressed for nearly 20 years.

A robber is pressing a gun to his head. Daly is convinced that he is going to die. He hears the trigger being pulled, but then nothing. The gun misfires.

The gunman flees with more than \$1 million in cash, gold and precious stones but is later caught and sentenced to life in prison.

Daly locked away the memory of that day in 1988 and moved on. Then, earlier this month, the letter arrived, and Daly suddenly was reliving those terrifying moments. This time, though, the gunman is seeking clemency and asking Daly for help in getting out of prison.

"He was going to kill me, and the [expletive] wants me to intercede on his behalf," Daly said.

The letter and the anxiety it provoked were overwhelming, Daly said. How could this be happening? How did this guy track him down?

The answer is simple. In Florida, victims have few protections to keep criminals behind bars from contacting them. There is no standing prohibition against inmates writing to their victims, nor is there a process to keep victims' home addresses out of reach.

Department of Corrections officials say they cannot realistically monitor correspondence from the state's 92,000 inmates. What's more, civil-rights organizations such as the American Civil Liberties Union have fought successfully to protect inmates' rights to correspond.

"Every offender has the right to write people," said JoEllyn Rackleff, a DOC spokeswoman.

DOC officials could not say how many times inmates have contacted their victims by mail or telephone, but the officials stress that they react quickly when they learn of unwanted contact.

Victims are not helpless. If asked, a judge can impose, at sentencing, a prohibition against contact. Or victims can contact DOC officials and make clear they don't want to hear from inmates.

"Inmates cannot send mail to someone who has informed us they don't want to be contacted," Rackleff said.

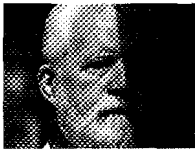
However, information about privacy rights is often lost on victims caught up in the chaos of an unfamiliar legal system. And even when a victim takes steps to block contact, the DOC generally intercedes only after an inmate violates the prohibition.

Victim advocates say they also find themselves reacting to an unwanted contact more often than preventing it in the first place.

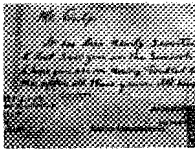
"We make sure to let victims know to contact us if they have any problems," said Isa Kennedy, coordinator for victim rights at the Seminole-Brevard State Attorney's Office. "... We react quickly so that it doesn't happen again."

But that is little consolation for Daly, who worries for himself and his family and is even concerned the gunman might try to get friends on the outside to contact him if he doesn't

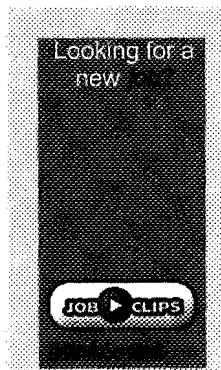
