SUMMARY ANALYSIS

The Division of Statutory Revision of the Office of Legislative Services is required, by statute, to conduct a systematic and continuing study of the Florida Statutes. The purpose of this study is to recommend to the Legislature changes that will remove inconsistencies, redundancies, and unnecessary repetition from the statutes; improve clarity and facilitate correct interpretation; correct grammatical and typographical errors; and delete obsolete, repealed, or superseded provisions. These recommendations are submitted to the Legislature in the form of technical, nonsubstantive reviser's bills.

This bill redesignates the Secretary of Health as the State Surgeon General wherever the term appears in the Florida Statutes pursuant to the directive of the Legislature in section 3, chapter 2007-40, Laws of Florida.

This bill has no fiscal impact.

Current Situation

The Division of Statutory Revision, under the authority and requirements of s. 11.242, Florida Statutes, submits reviser's bills to the rules committees of both houses as needed. General reviser's bills are submitted every year to clean up obsolete language, update cross-references, correct grammatical and typographical errors, and the like.

Proposed Changes

The effect of this bill is technical only; reviser's bills do not contain substantive changes. The bill will clean up grammatical and similar errors in the Florida Statutes. This bill amends and repeals various statutory provisions.

C. SECTION DIRECTORY:

Sections 1-2, 4-33, 35-49, 51-86, 88-90, 92-108, 111-112 redesignate the Secretary of Health as the State Surgeon General.

Section 3 substitutes the word "head" for the word "secretary" to account for the change to State Surgeon General.

Section 34, 50, 87, 91 repeals provisions that are made obsolete by the redesignation of the Secretary of Health as the State Surgeon General.

Sections 109-110 specifies the term "State Surgeon General" and another agency secretary in place of the term "secretaries."

Section 113 provides an effective date.
