12 that drug testing will be conducted as a condition for receiving
13 TANF benefits and that the individual must bear the cost of
14 testing. The individual shall be advised that the required drug
15 testing may be avoided if the individual does not apply for TANF
16 benefits. Dependent children under the age of 18 are exempt from
17 the drug-testing requirement.

18 (b) Require that for two-parent families, both parents
19 must comply with the drug-testing requirement.

20 (c) Require that any teen parent who is not required to
21 live with a parent, legal guardian, or other adult caretaker
22 relative in accordance with s. 414.095(14)(c) must comply with

24 (d) Advise each individual to be tested, before the test
25 is conducted, that he or she may, but is not required to, advise
26 the agent administering the test of any prescription or over-
27 the-counter medication he or she is taking.

28 (e) Require each individual to be tested to sign a written
29 acknowledgment that he or she has received and understood the
30 notice and advice provided under paragraphs (a) and (d).

31 (f) Assure each individual being tested a reasonable
32 degree of dignity while producing and submitting a sample for
33 drug testing, consistent with the state's need to ensure the
34 reliability of the sample.

35 (g) Specify circumstances under which an individual who
36 fails a drug test has the right to take one or more additional
37 tests.

38 (h) Inform an individual who tests positive for a
39 controlled substance and is deemed ineligible for TANF benefits
40 that the individual may reapply for those benefits 1 year after
41 the date of the positive drug test unless the individual meets
42 the requirements of paragraph (j). If the individual tests
43 positive again, he or she is ineligible to receive TANF benefits

44 for 3 years after the date of the second positive drug test
45 unless the individual meets the requirements of paragraph (j).

46 (i) Provide any individual who tests positive with a list
47 of licensed substance abuse treatment providers available in the
48 area in which he or she resides that meet the requirements of s.
49 397.401 and are licensed by the department. Neither the
50 department nor the state is responsible for providing or paying
51 for substance abuse treatment as part of the screening conducted
52 under this section.

53 (j) An individual who tests positive under this section
54 and is denied TANF benefits as a result may reapply for those
55 benefits after 6 months if the individual can document the
56 successful completion of a substance abuse treatment program
57 offered by a provider that meets the requirements of s. 397.401
58 and is licensed by the department. An individual who has met the
59 requirements of this paragraph and reapplies for TANF benefits
60 must also pass an initial drug test and meet the requirements of
61 subsection (1). Any drug test conducted while the individual is
62 undergoing substance abuse treatment must meet the requirements
63 of subsection (1). The cost of any drug testing and substance
64 abuse treatment provided under this section shall be the
65 responsibility of the individual being tested and receiving
66 treatment. An individual who fails the drug test required under
67 subsection (1) may reapply for benefits under this paragraph
68 only once.

54 each price level. The posting must be at least 15 square feet
55 in size. A primary care provider who publishes and maintains a
56 schedule of charges for medical services is exempt from the
57 license fee requirements for a single period of renewal of a
58 professional license under chapter 456 for that licensure term
59 and is exempt from the continuing education requirements of
60 chapter 456 and the rules implementing those requirements for a
61 single 2-year period.

62 4. If a primary care provider chooses to publish a
63 schedule of charges for the medical services that the provider
64 offers to patients, the provider must continually post a
65 schedule of charges at all times that primary care services are
66 provided to patients, for the duration of active licensure in
67 Florida. If a primary care provider fails to post the schedule
68 of charges at all times that medical services are provided to
69 patients, the provider will be required to pay any license fee
70 and comply with any continuing education requirements for which
71 an exemption was received for posting the schedule of charges.

Mercer National Survey of Employer-Sponsored Health Plans 2010

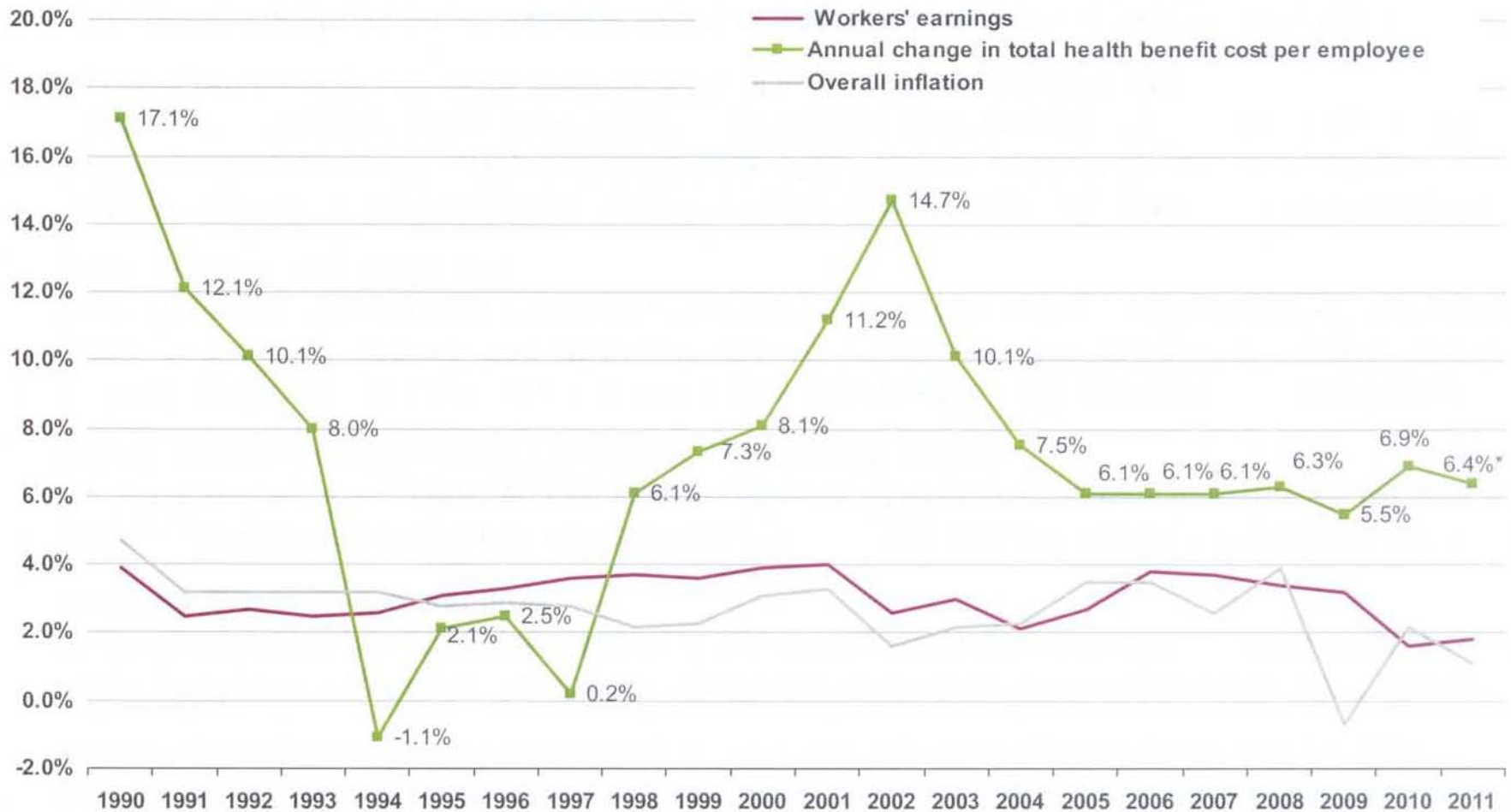

Mercer National Survey of Employer-Sponsored Health Plans 2010

Key Findings

- After five years of cost increases averaging around 6%, growth in the average total health benefit cost per employee picked up steam in 2010, rising by nearly 7% -- three times faster than the CPI. Following a relatively low 5.5% increase in 2009, this was the biggest increase since 2004.
- Large employers experienced a sharper cost increase than smaller employers in 2010. Average health benefit cost per employee rose by 8.5% among employers with 500 or more employees, to exceed \$10,000 for the first time.
- Large employers may have been taken by surprise by the uptick in the cost increase in 2010. In our 2009 survey, they predicted that they could hold 2010 cost increases to just 5.6% on average, but actual cost increases for 2010 came in significantly higher.
- To hold down cost increases in 2010, employers continued to shift cost to employees through higher deductibles, copays, and other cost-sharing provisions. Over the past five years, among large employers the average total cost per employee and the average individual PPO deductible have each risen by about 35%.
- State governments (States 500+) reported a higher average age (46) among active employees than large employers in Florida and nationwide (42). Women account for just over half of employees for States (53%), Florida (55%), and large US employers (53%). The State of Florida reported an average age of 45 and that 53% of its employees were female.
- State governments report an average salary of \$44,536 compared to \$46,011 and \$51,215 for Florida and large US employers, respectively. The State of Florida reported an average salary of \$38,517 when responding to the survey.

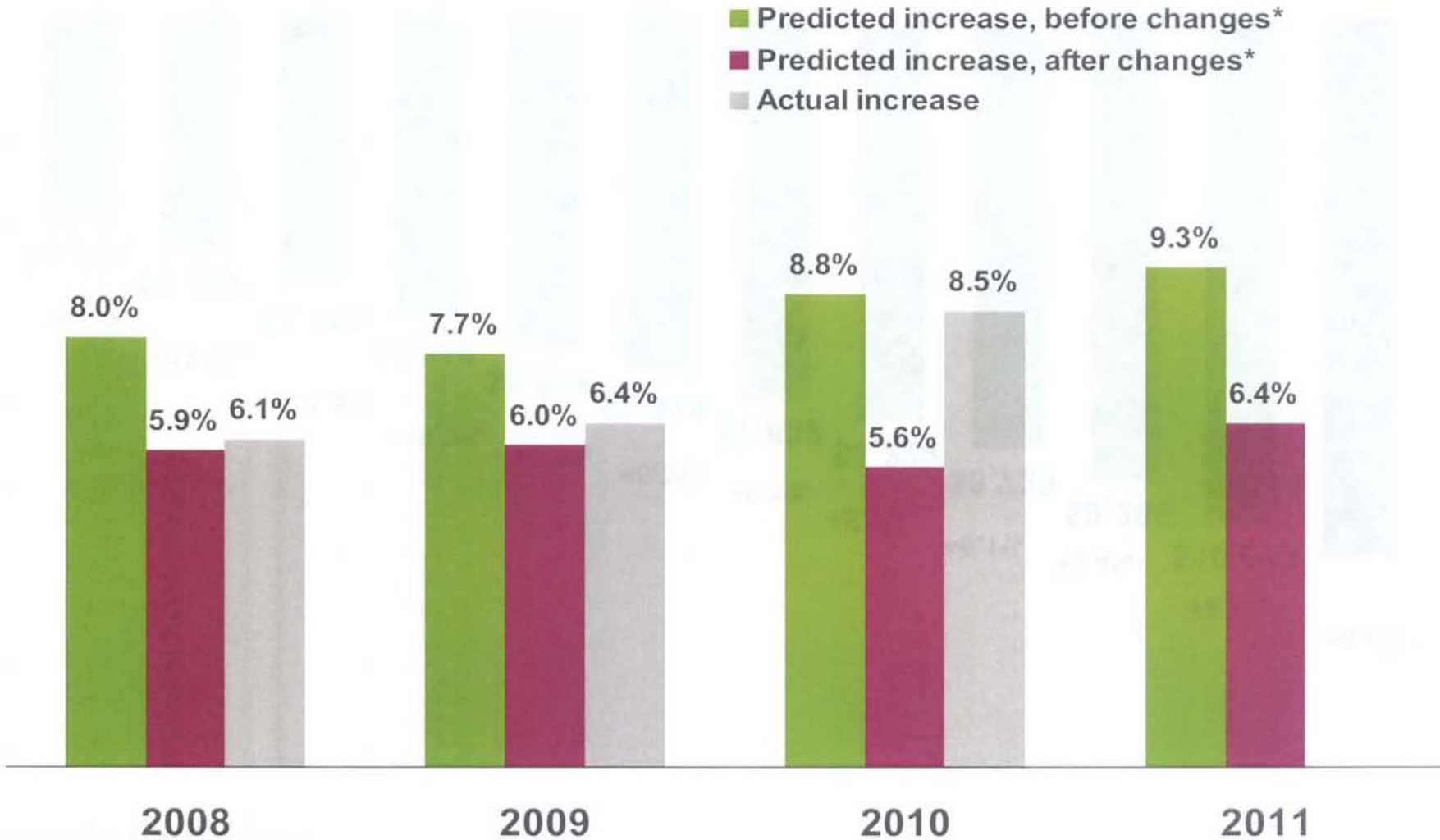
Total health benefit cost for active employees up 8.5% in 2010

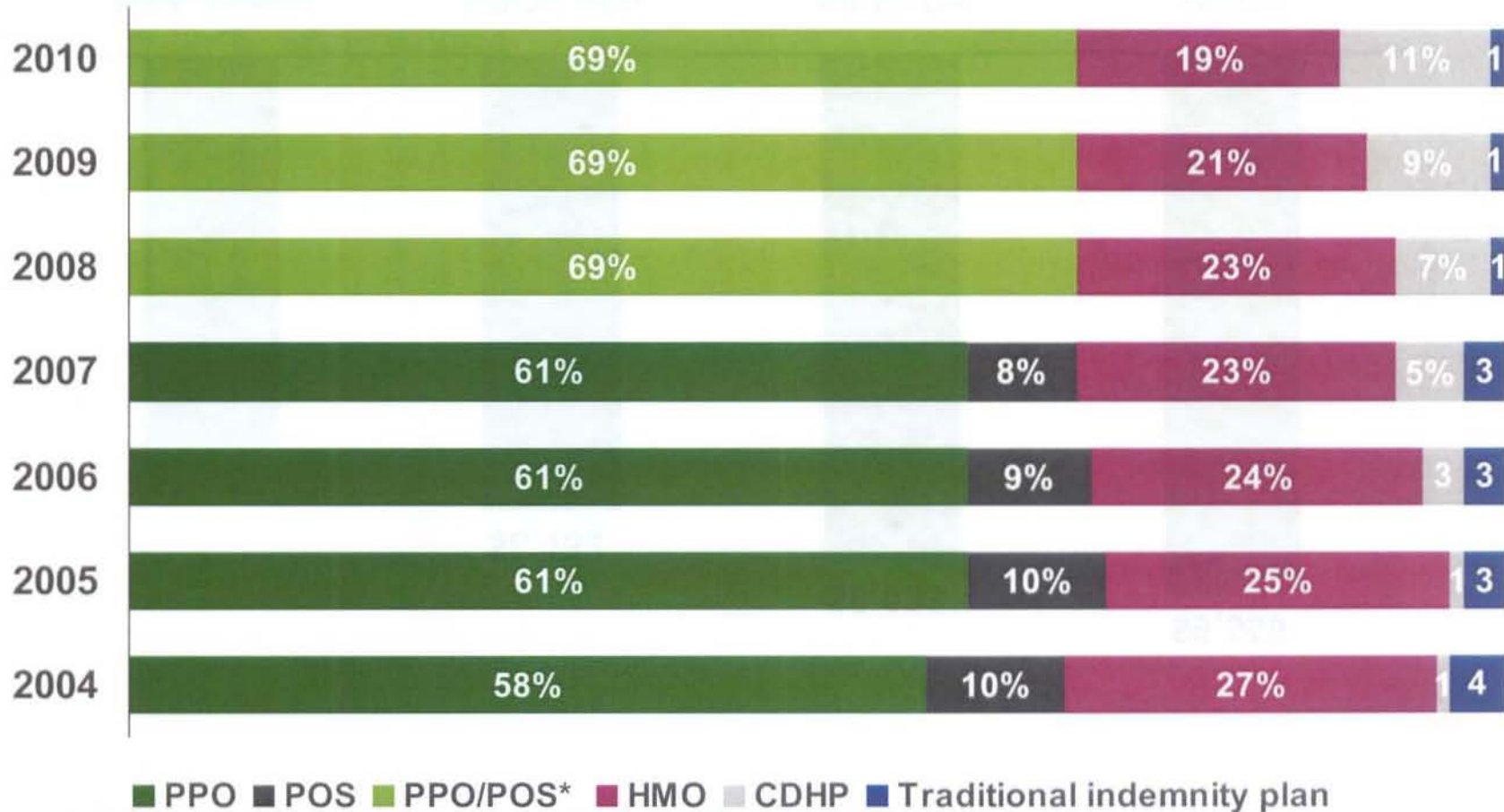

Enrollment in CDHPs continues to rise as HMOs lose ground

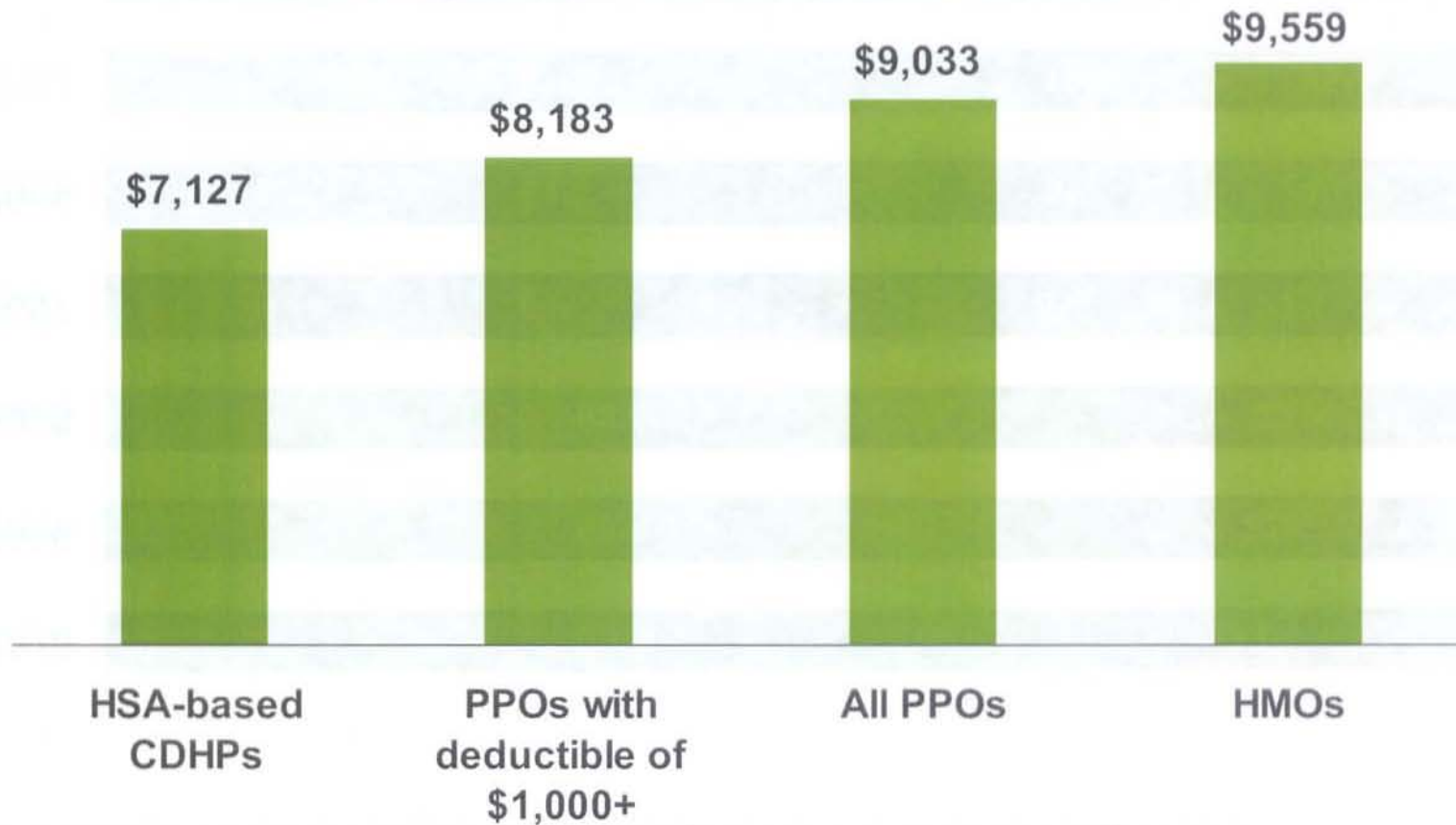
Percentage of all covered employees enrolled in each plan type

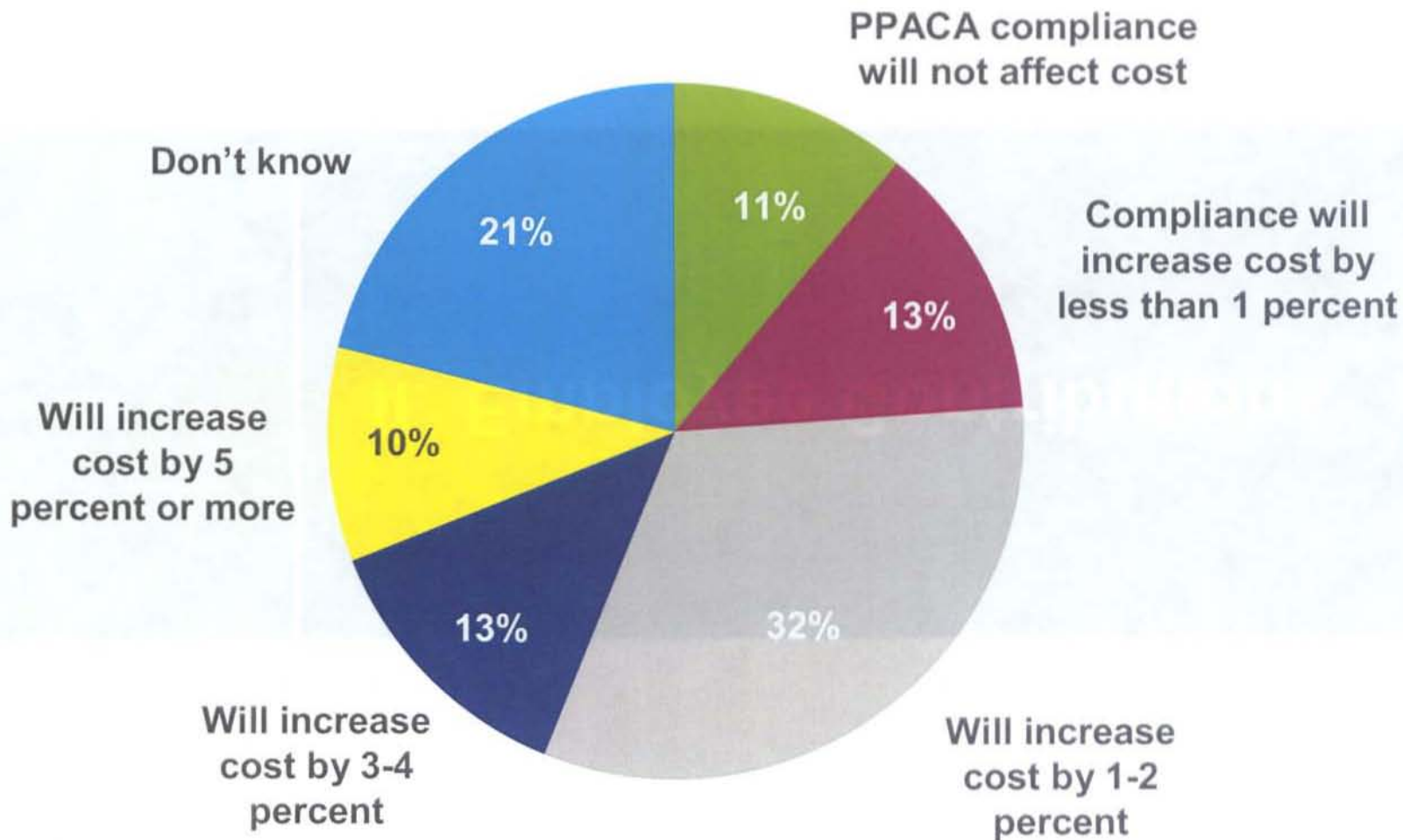

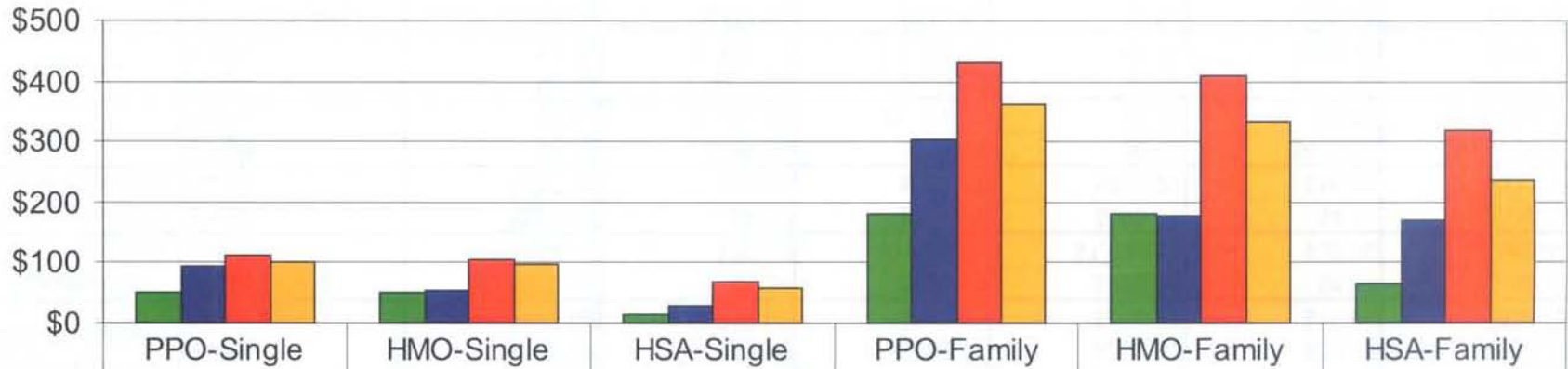

Monthly employee contribution (dollars)

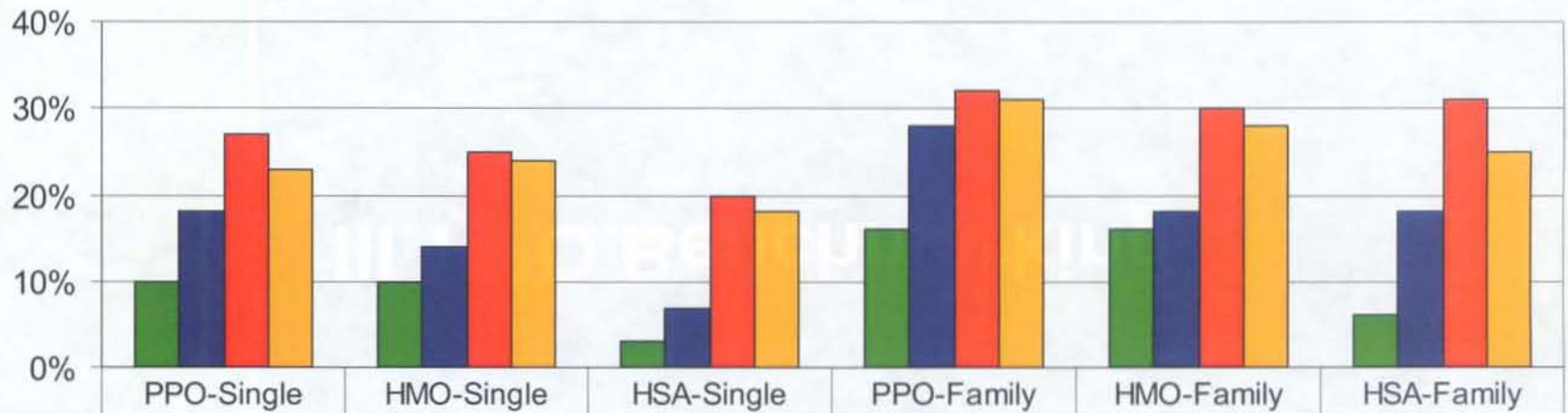

Offer PPO*, by region; percent of employees enrolled

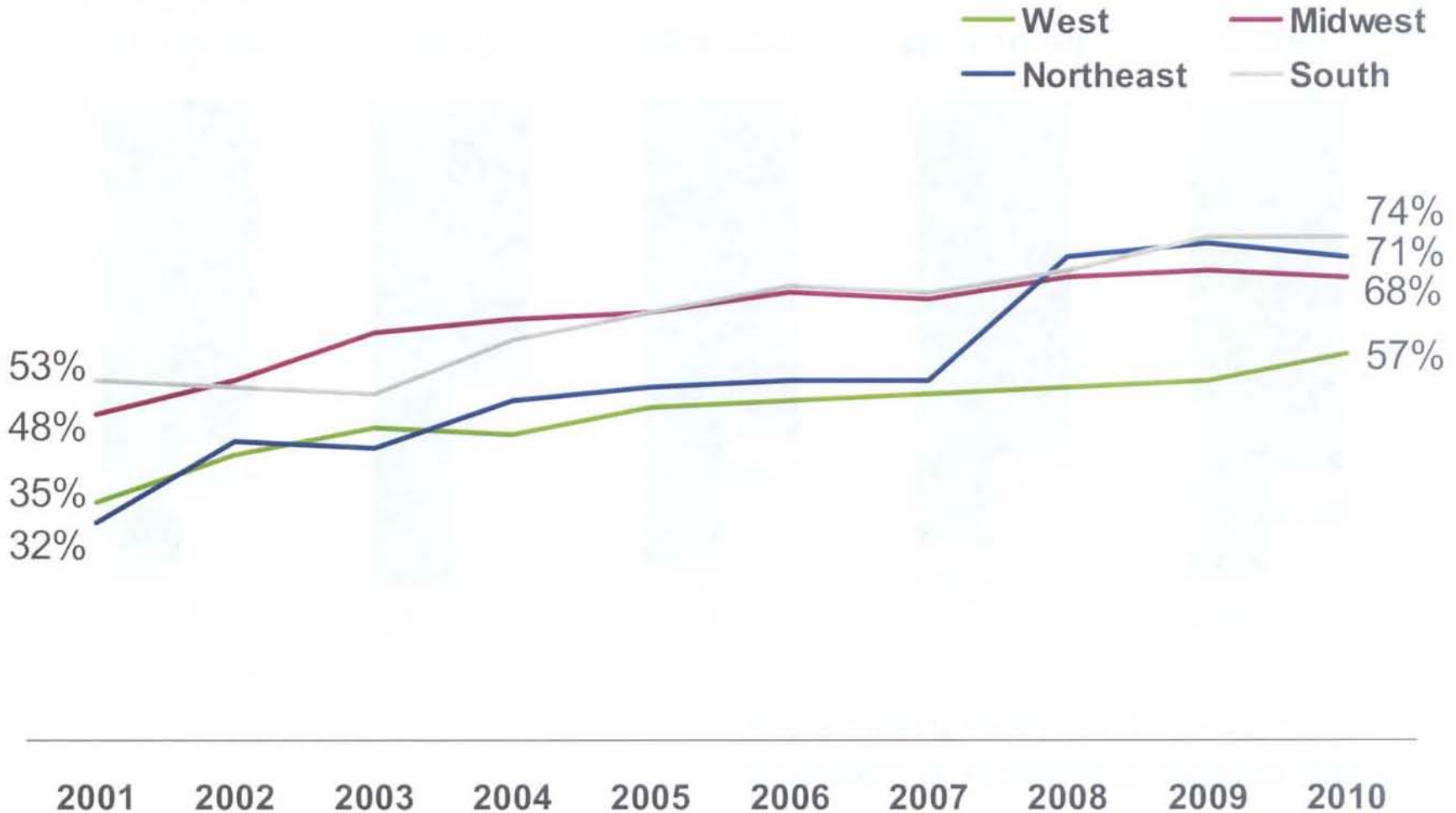

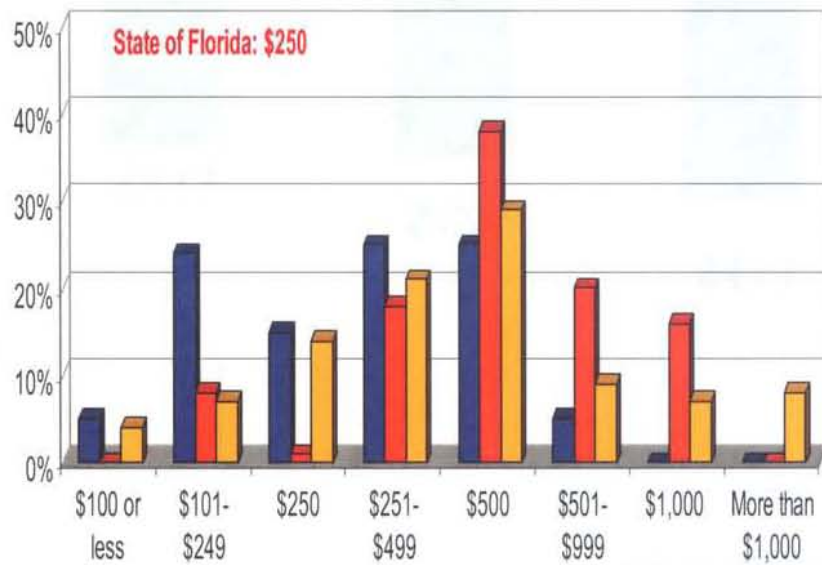
Average PPO deductible for individual, in-network coverage, among large employers

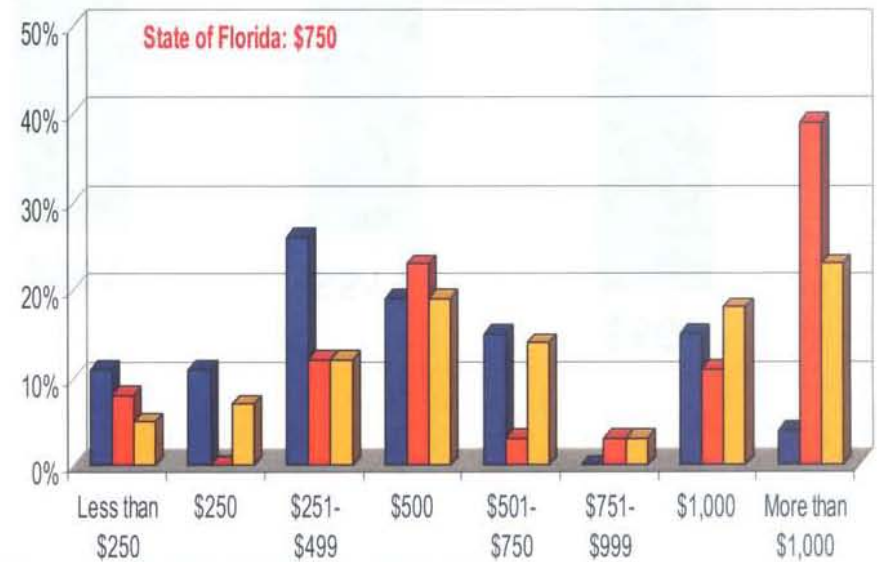


2010 PPO Benchmarks vs. 2010 Plan Individual Deductible

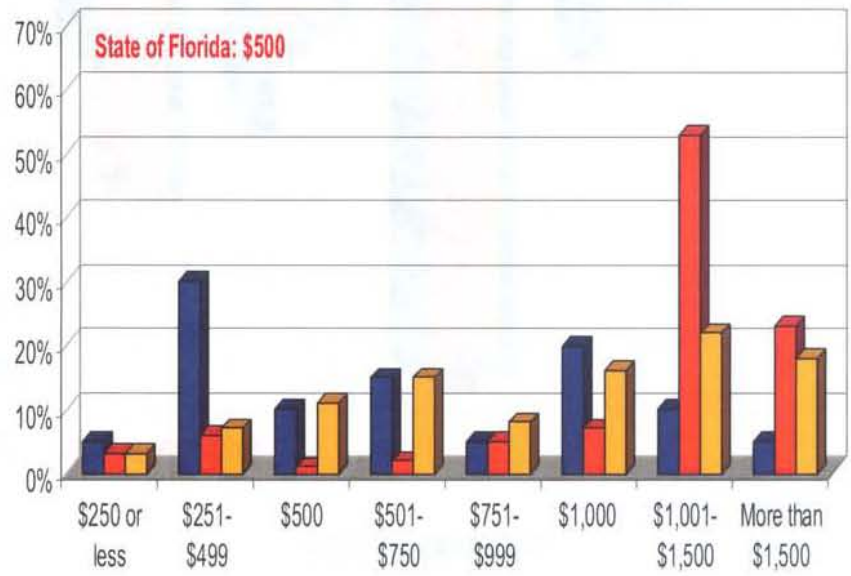

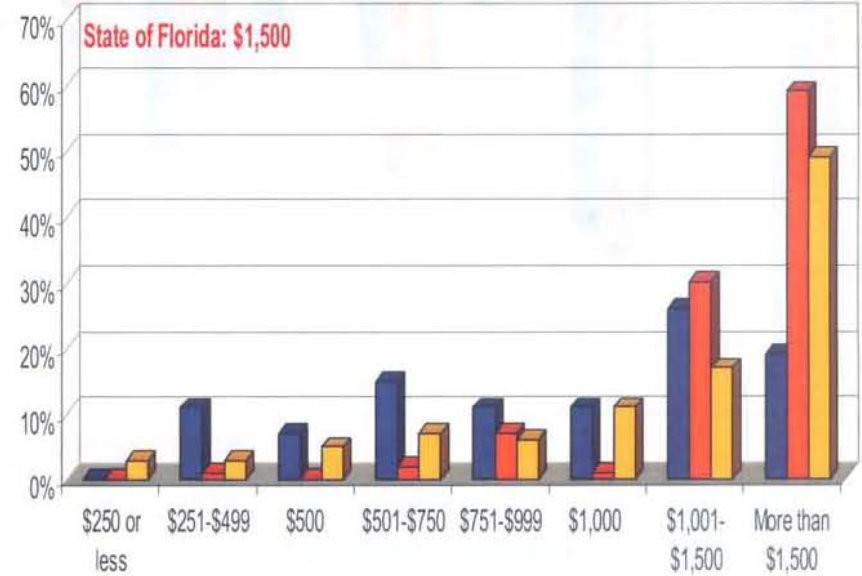

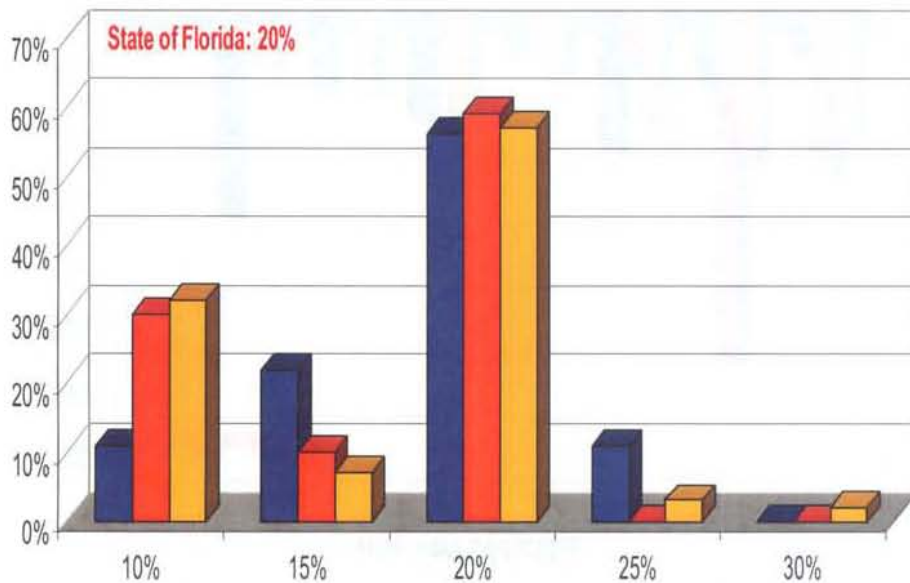

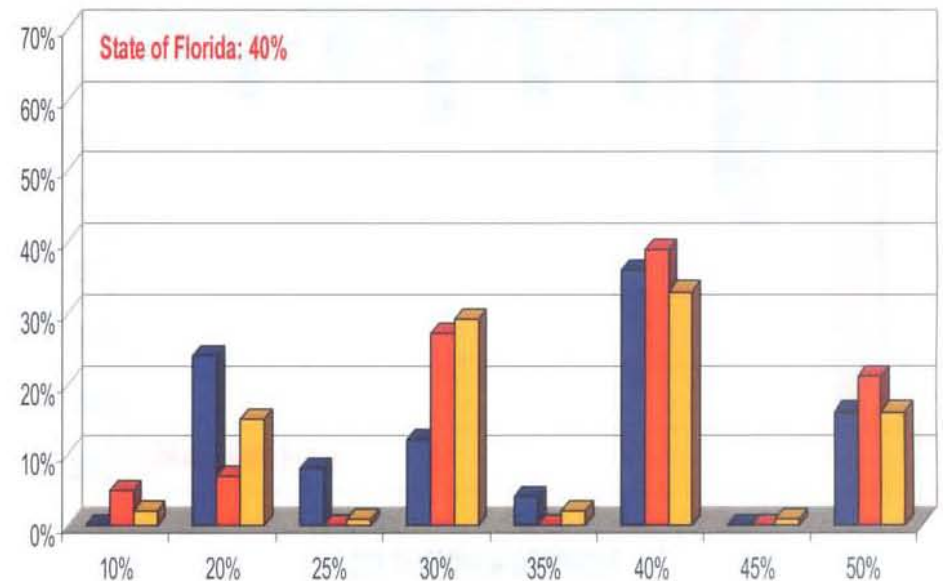
2010 PPO Benchmarks vs. 2010 Plan Participant Coinsurance

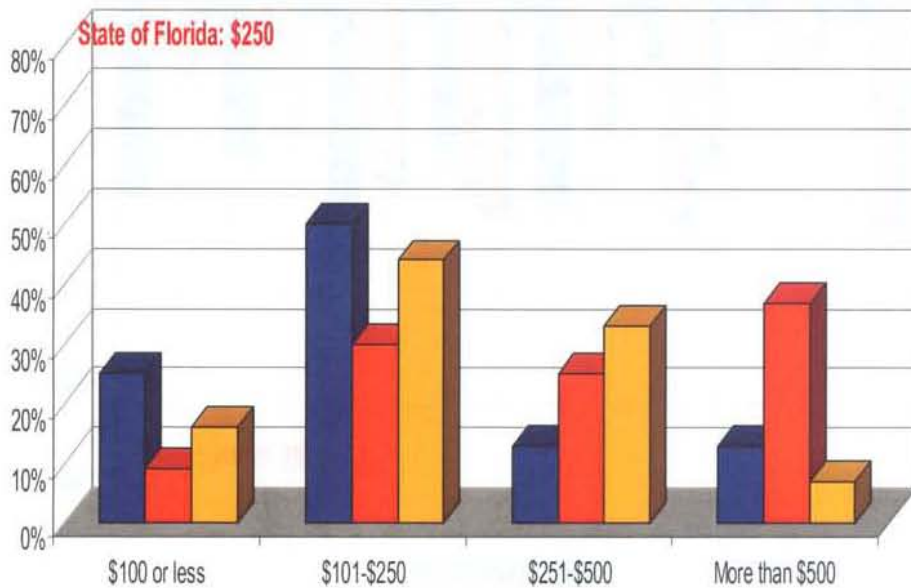

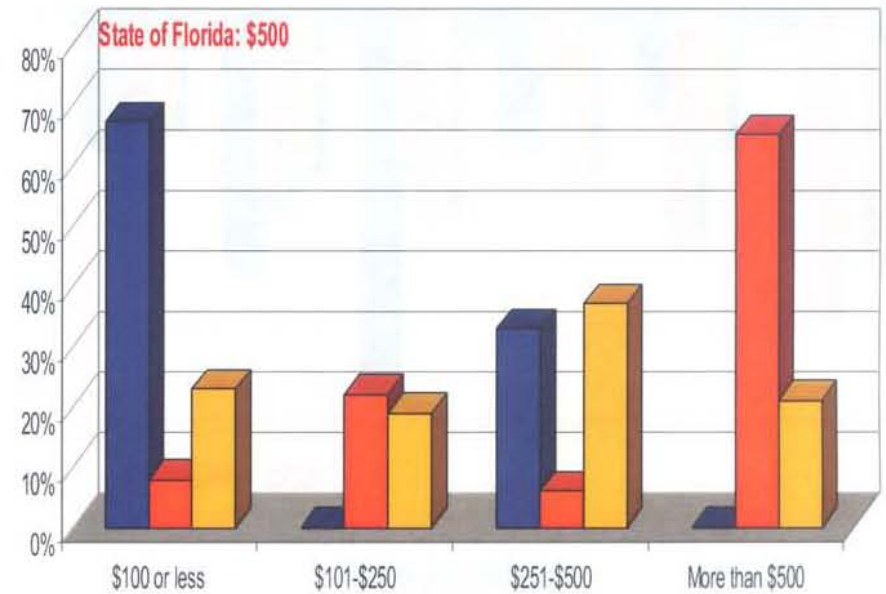


2010 PPO Benchmarks vs. 2010 Plan Inpatient/Hospital Copayment

In Network Copay

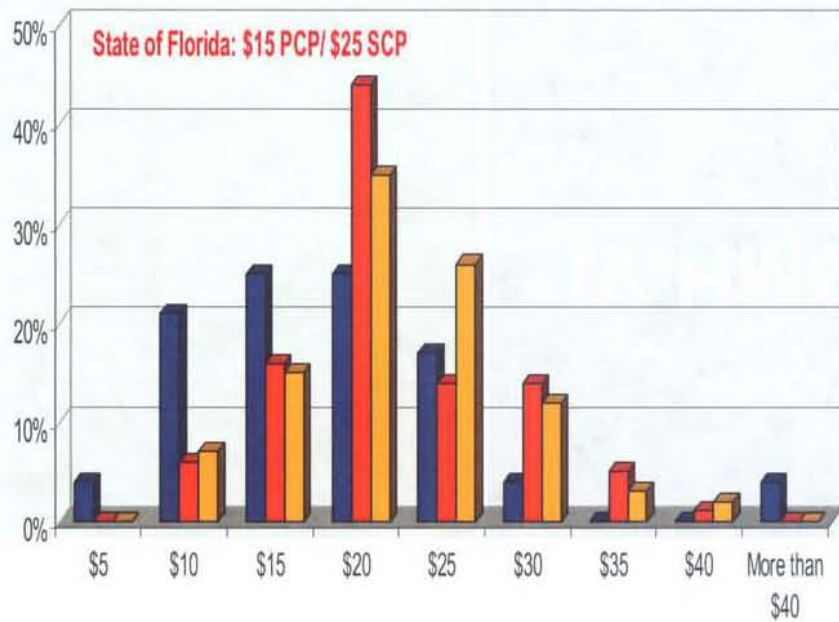

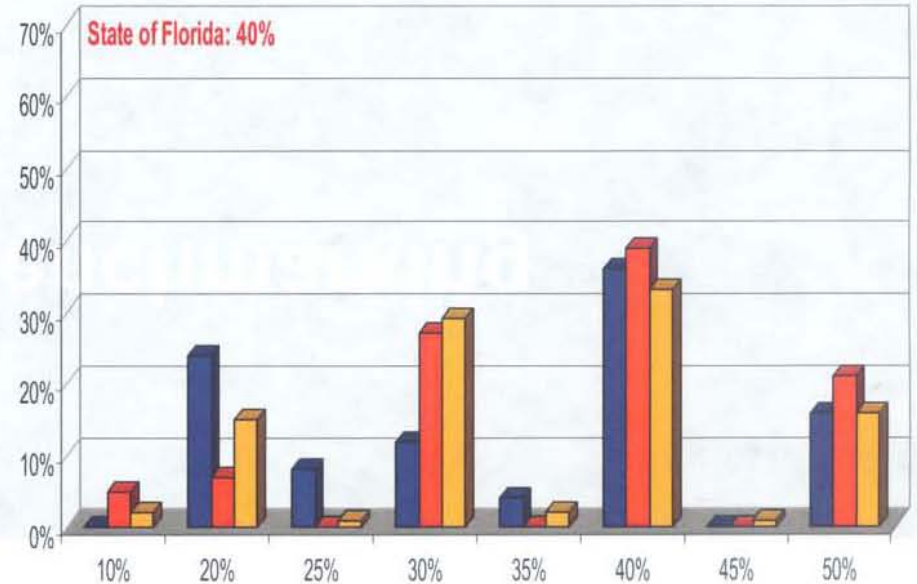

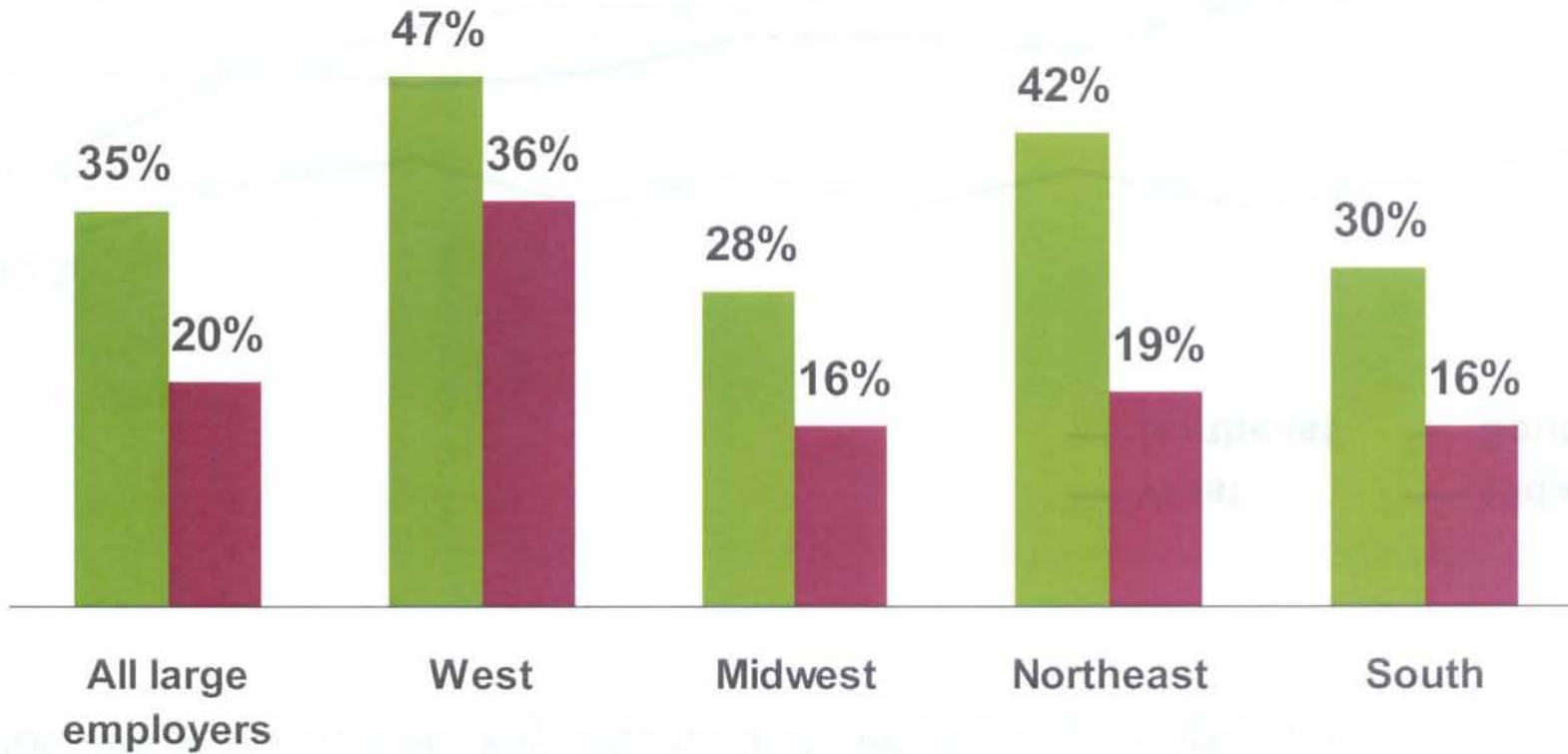

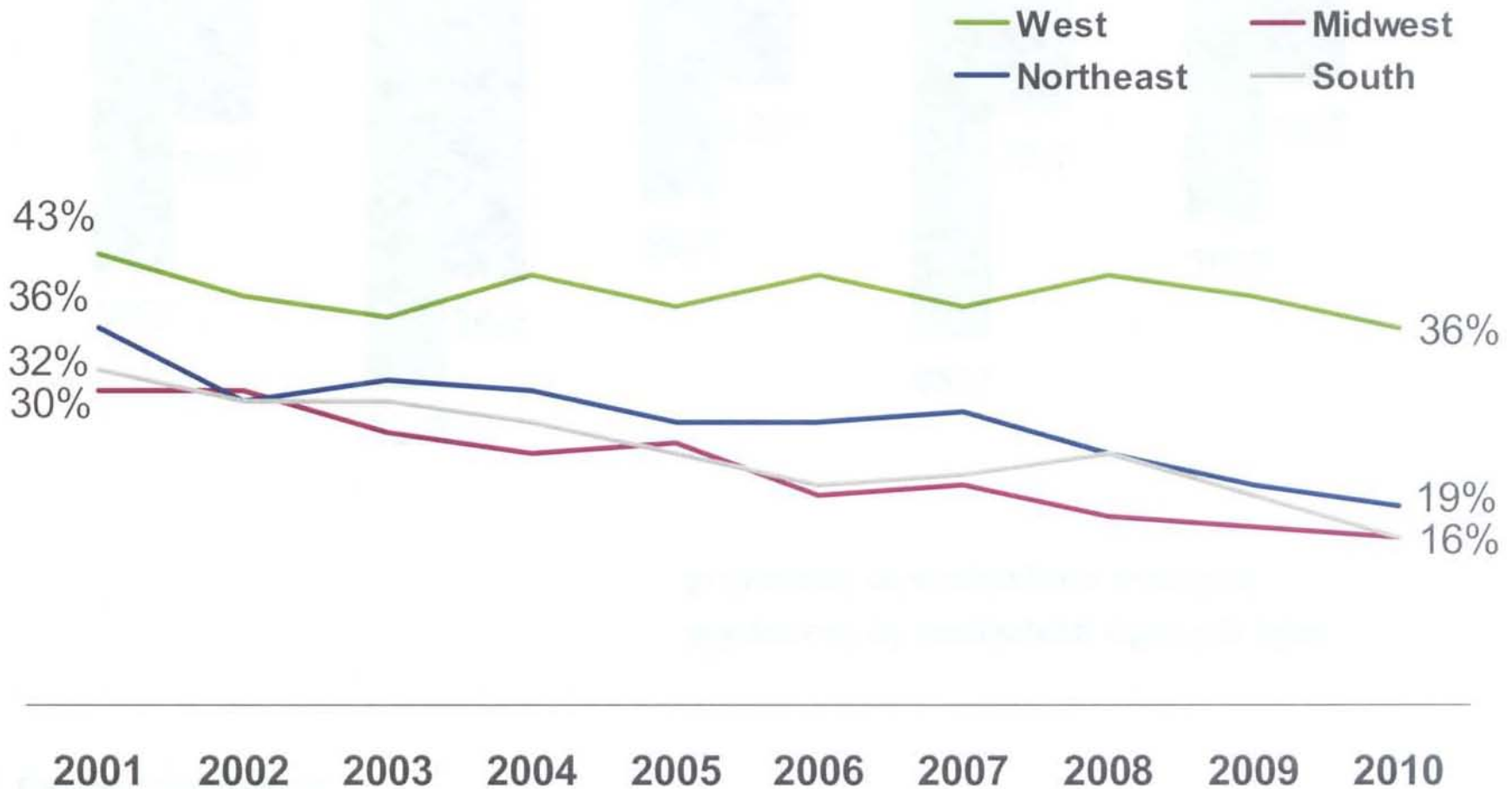

Percent of covered employees enrolled, among large employers



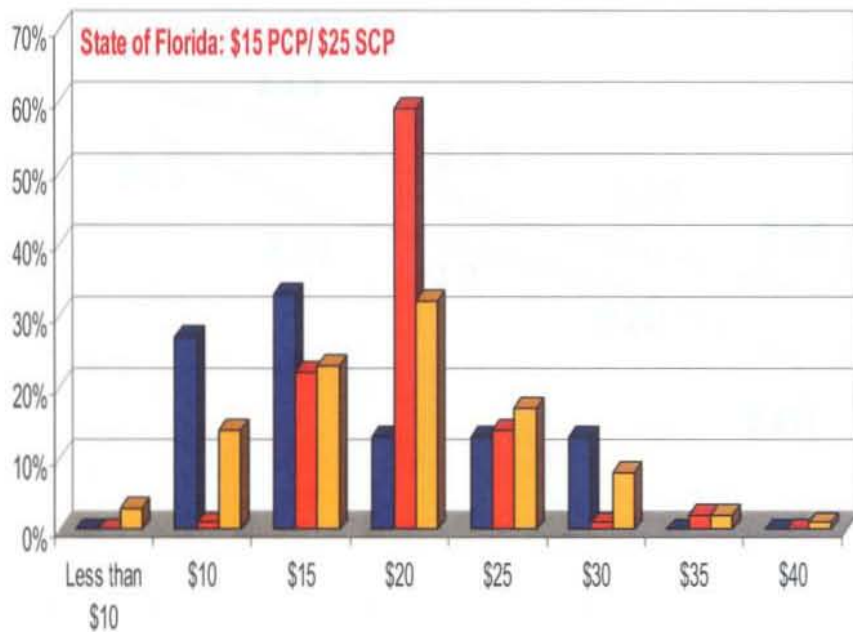

Average copay for physician visits

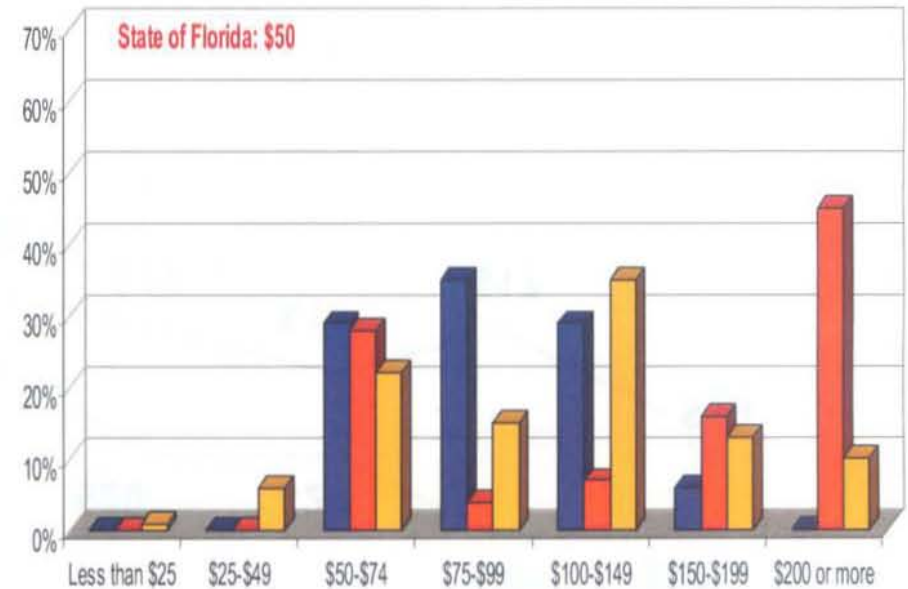

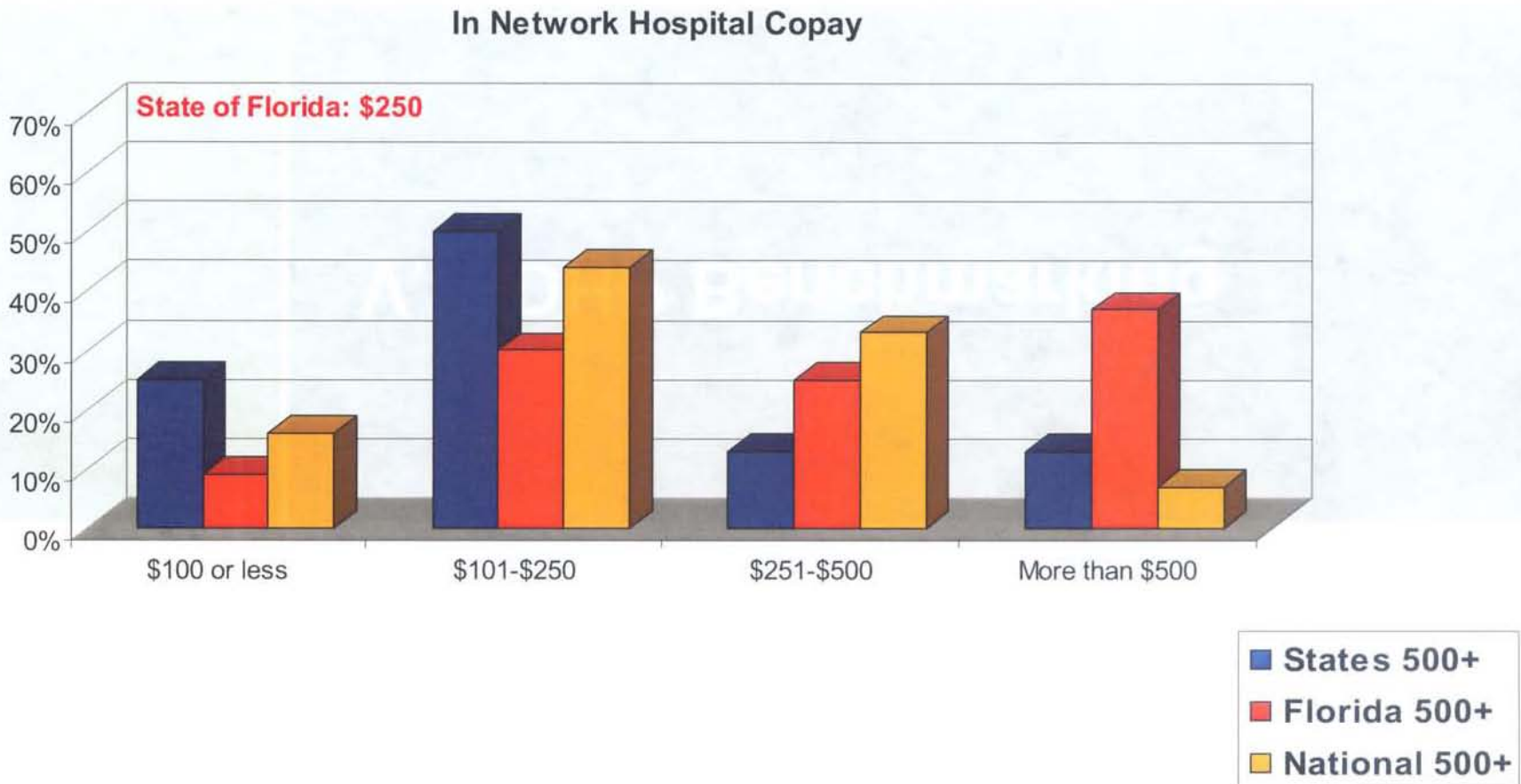
In Network PCP Office Visit Copay

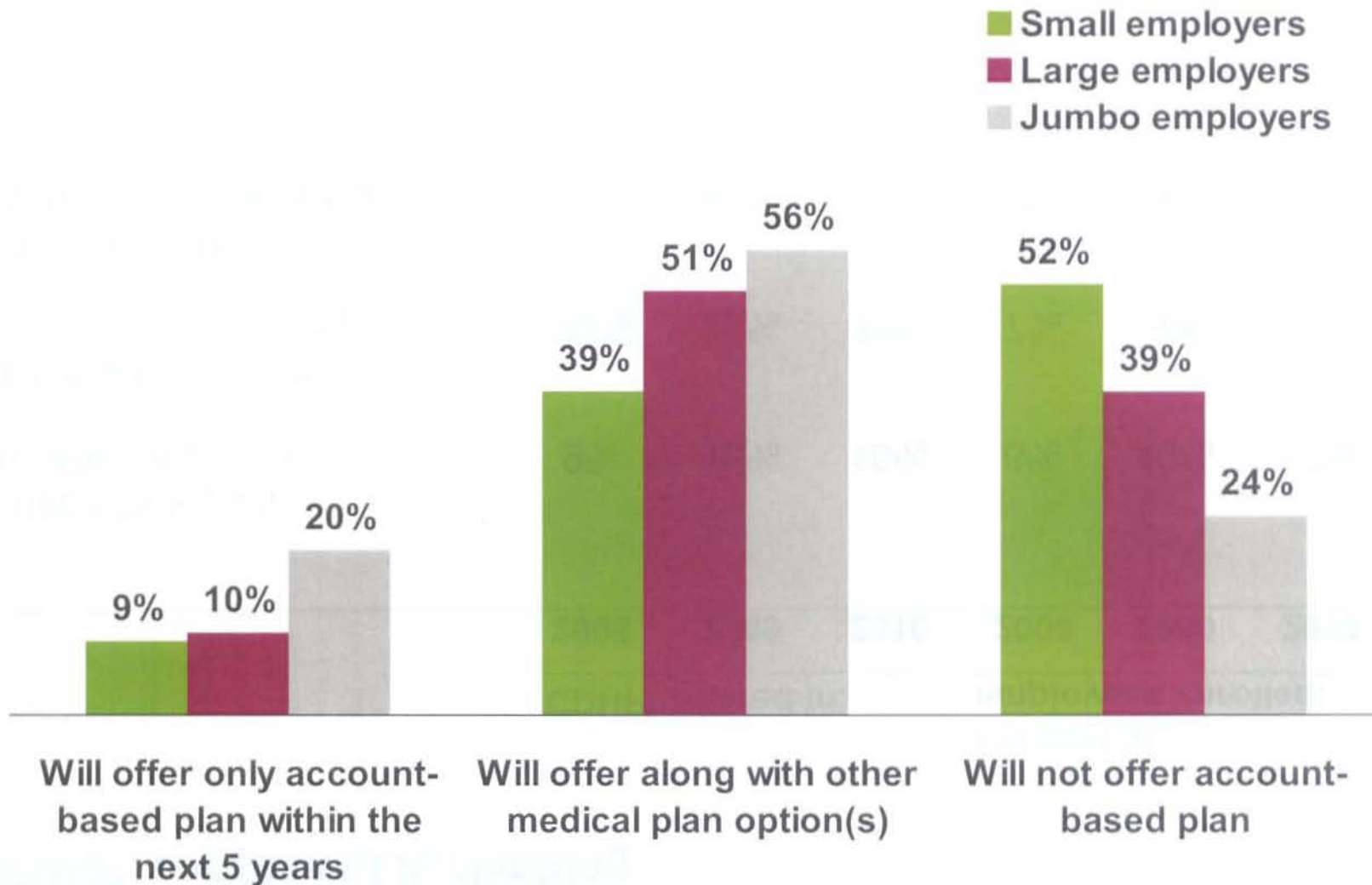

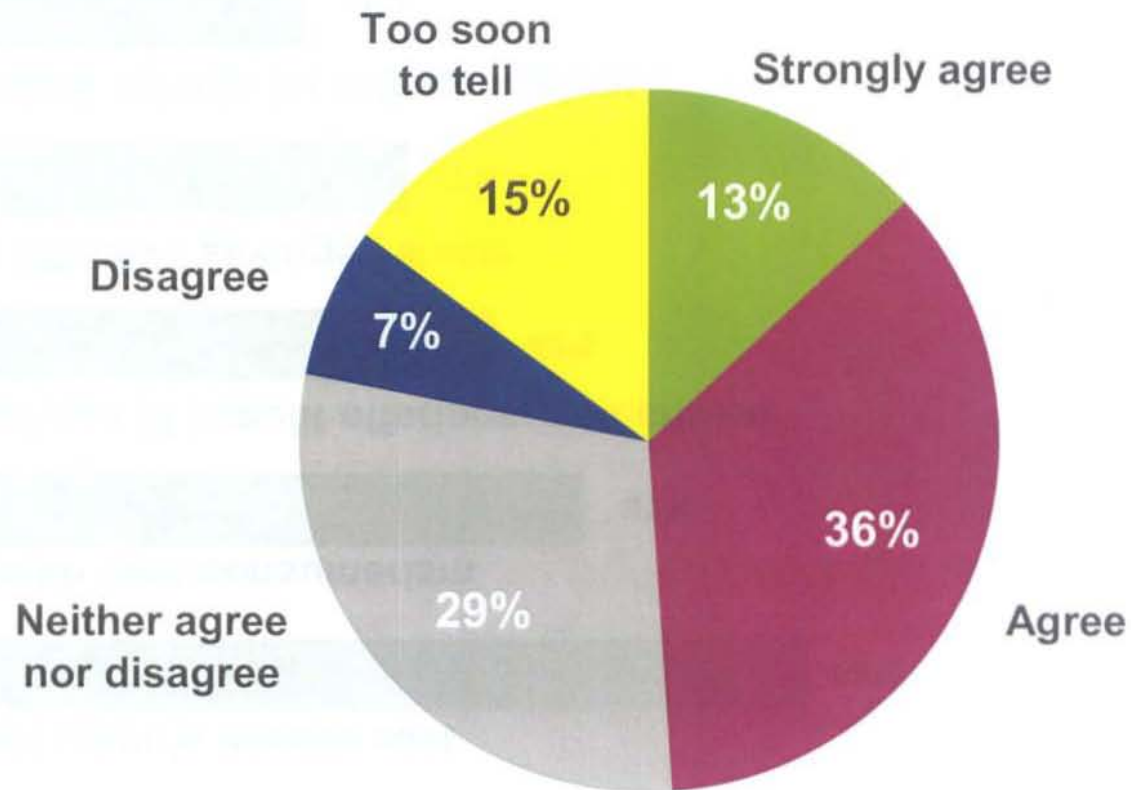

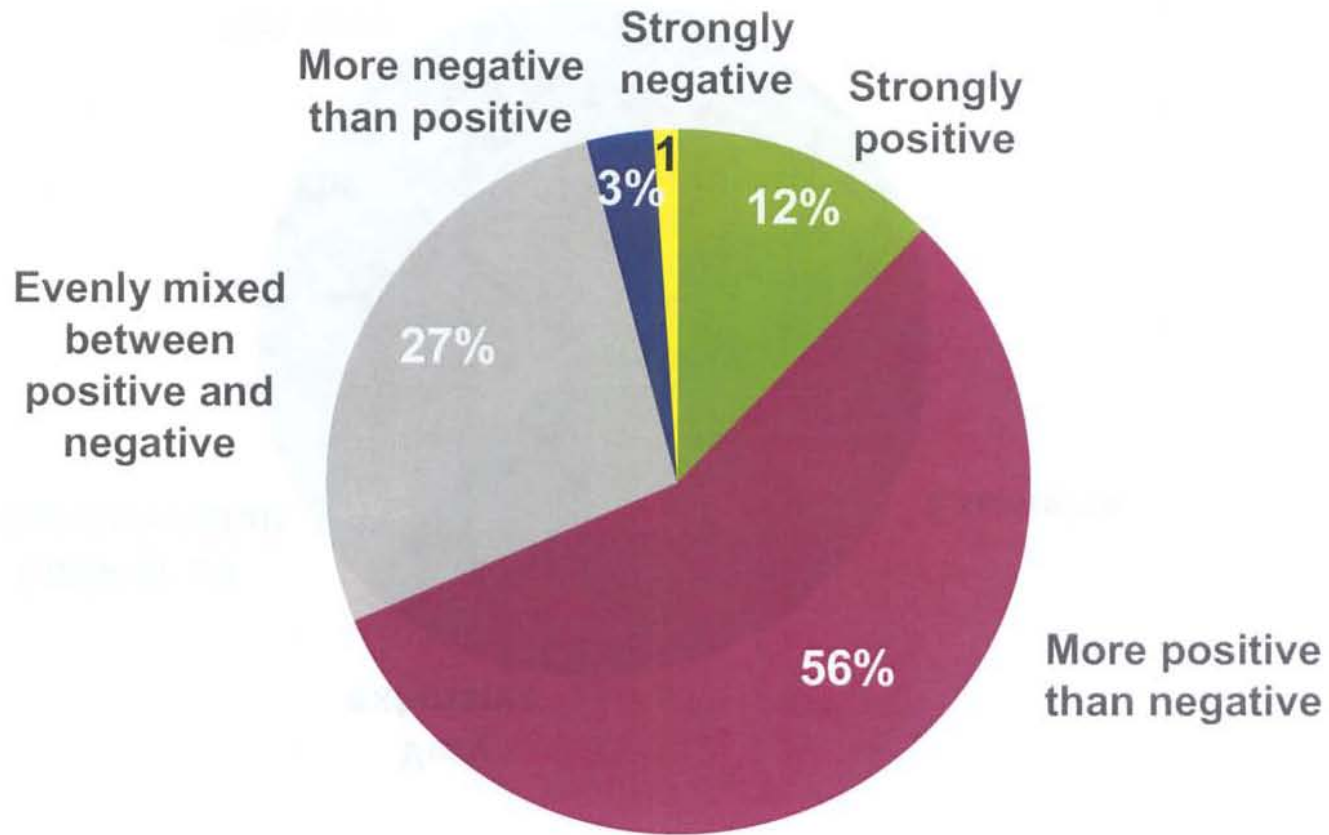

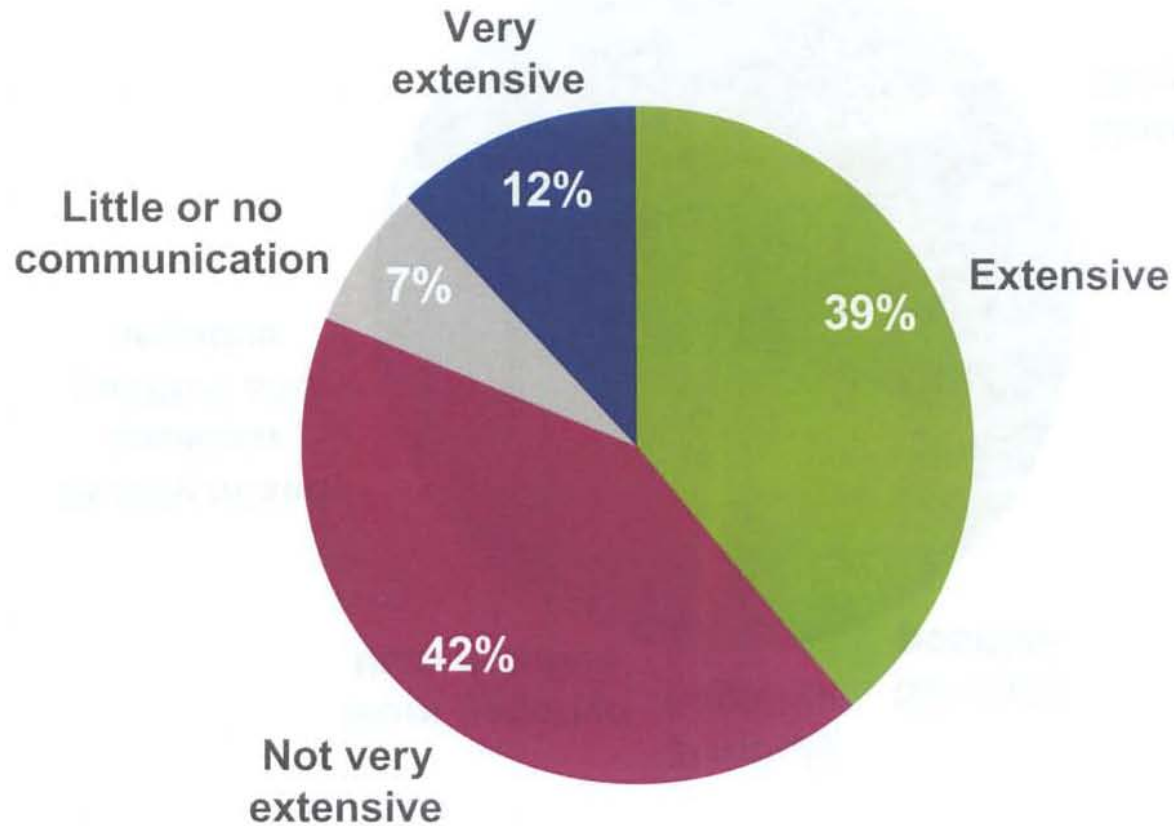
Employee reaction to HSA-eligible CDHP

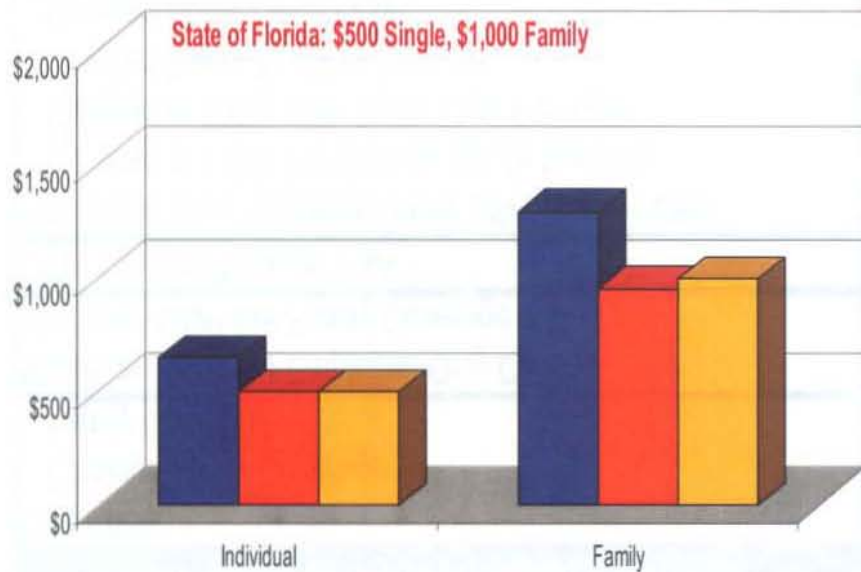

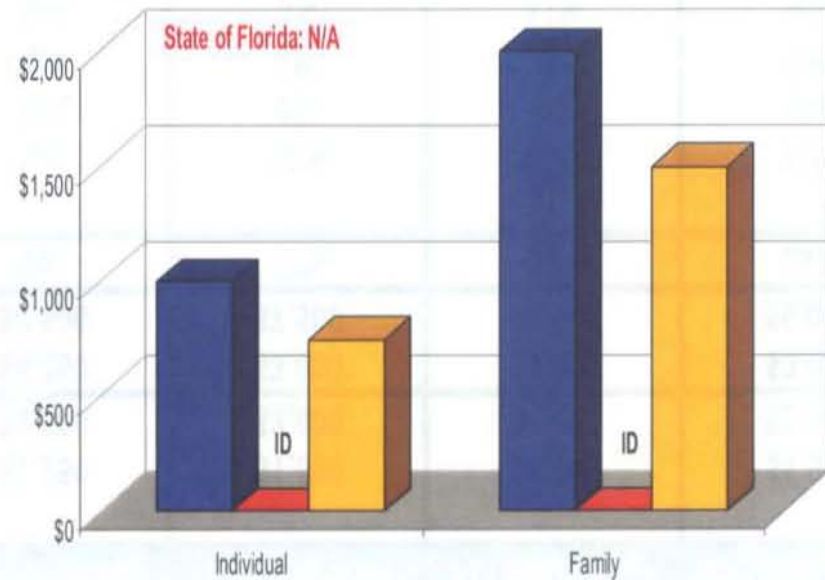


2010 CDHP Benchmarks vs. 2010 Plan Median Employer Contribution to HSA or HRA

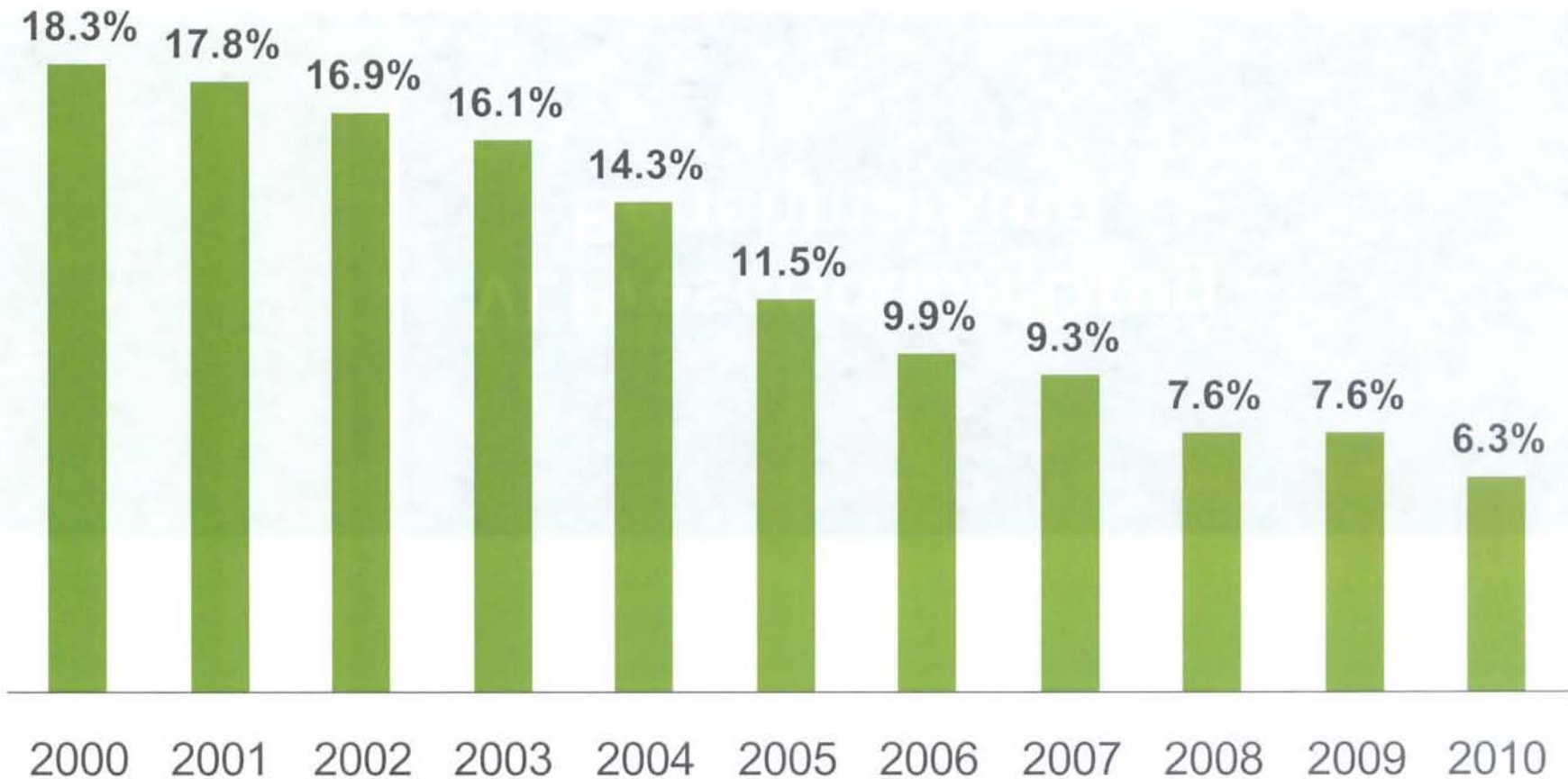

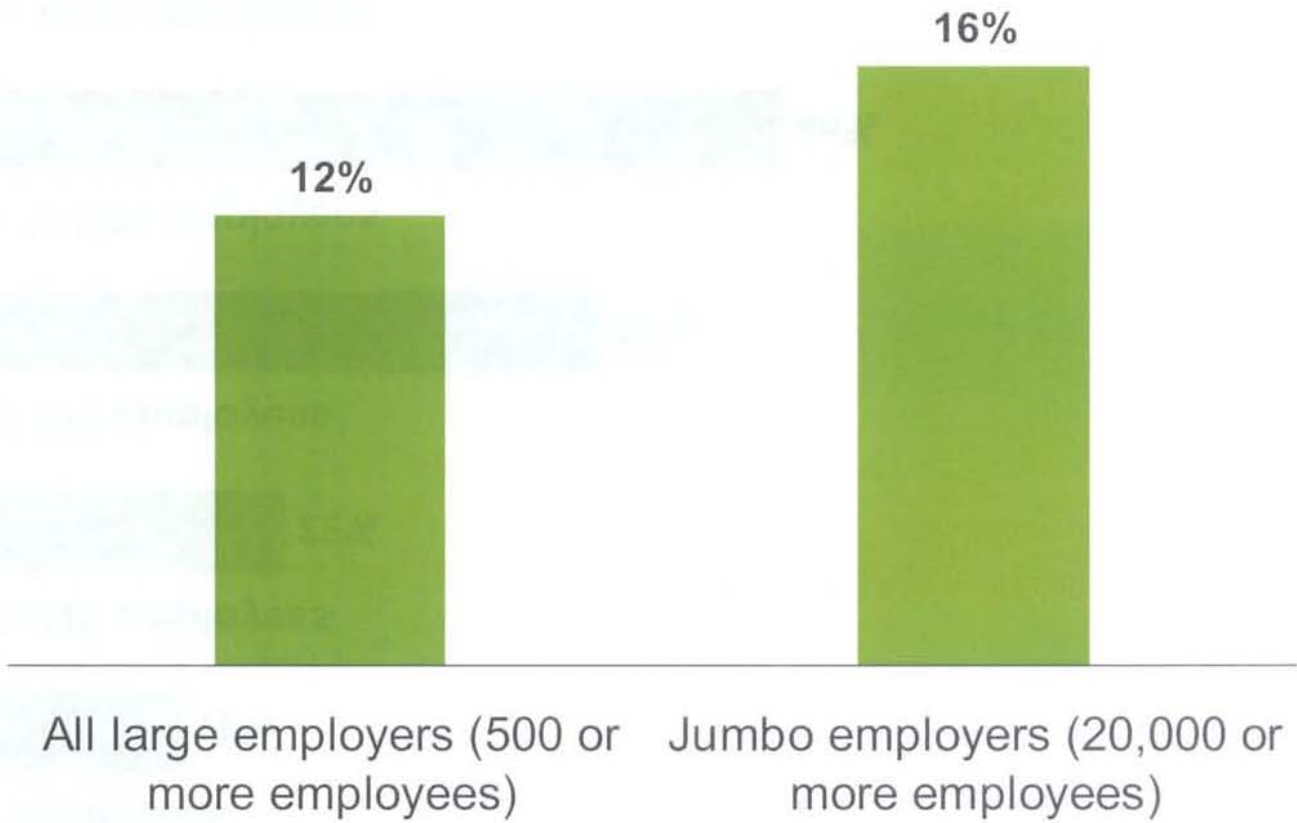

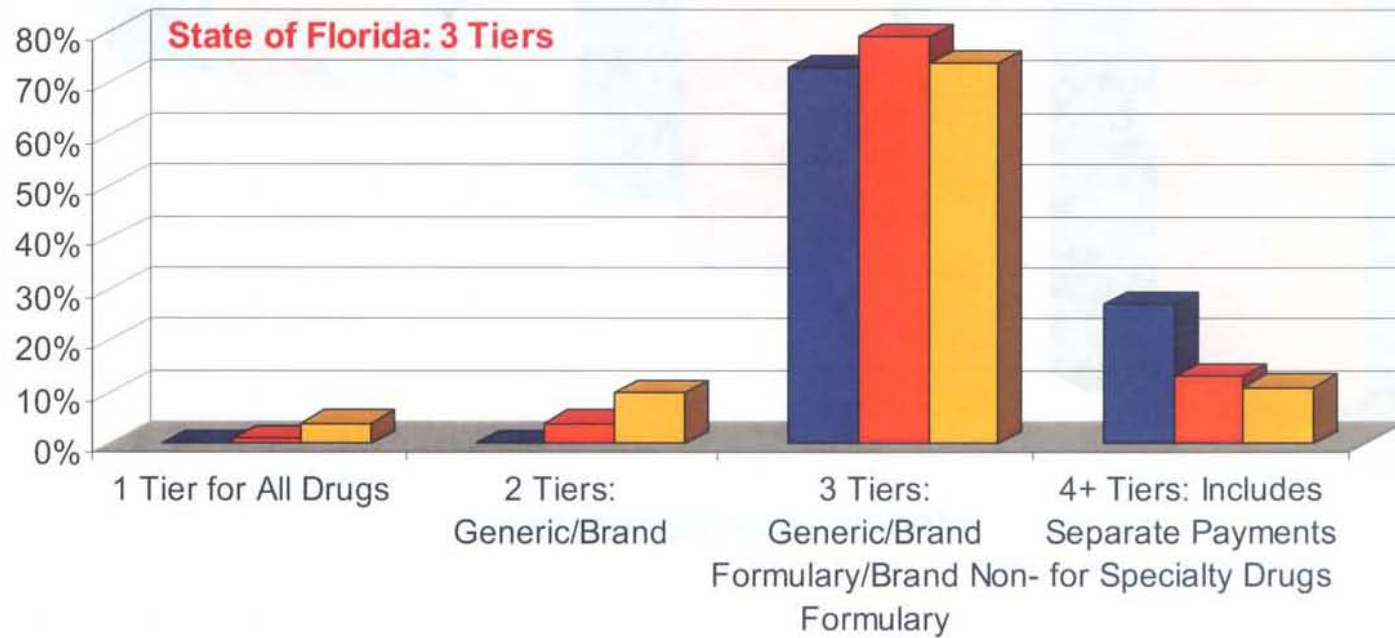

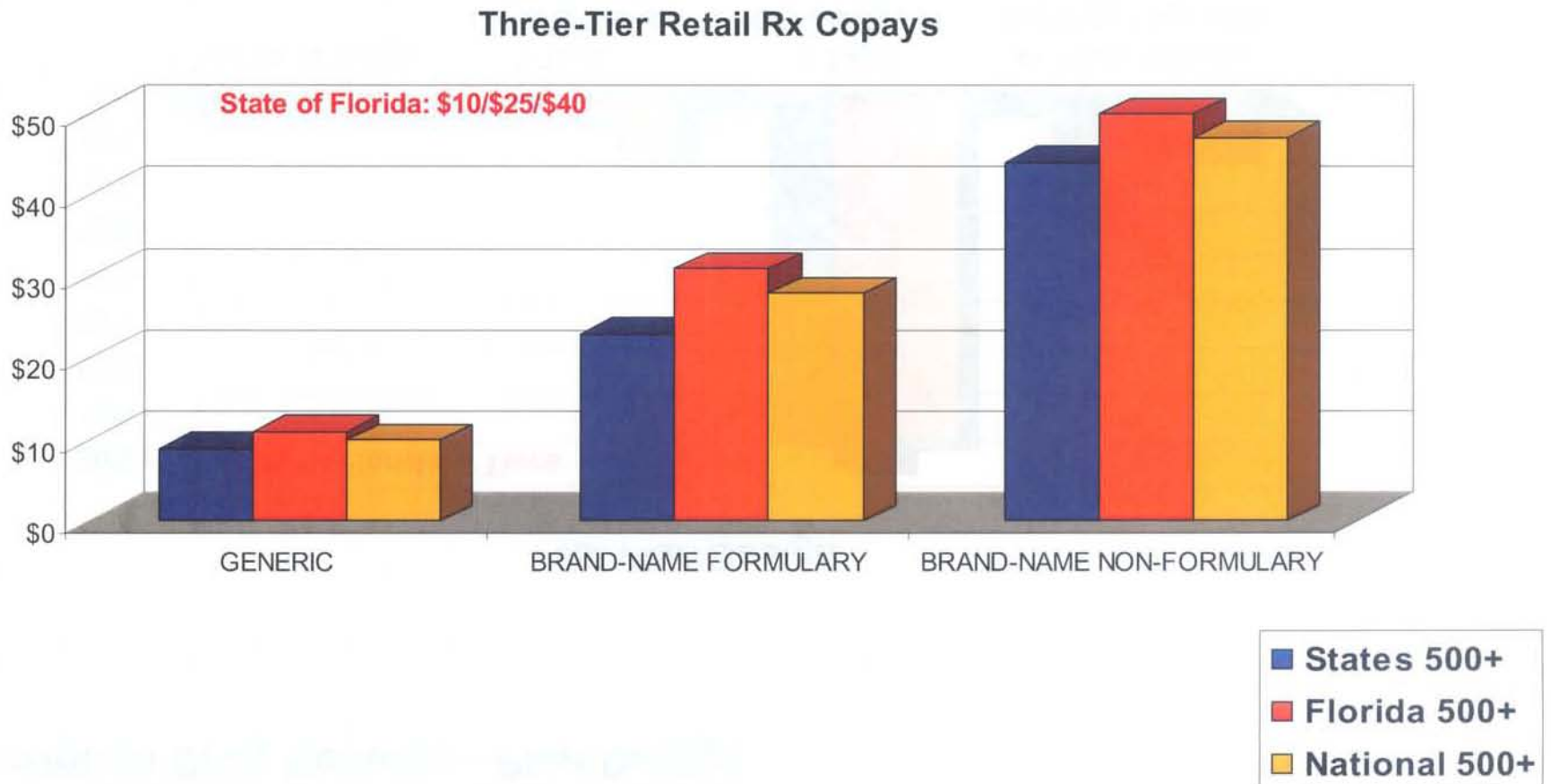

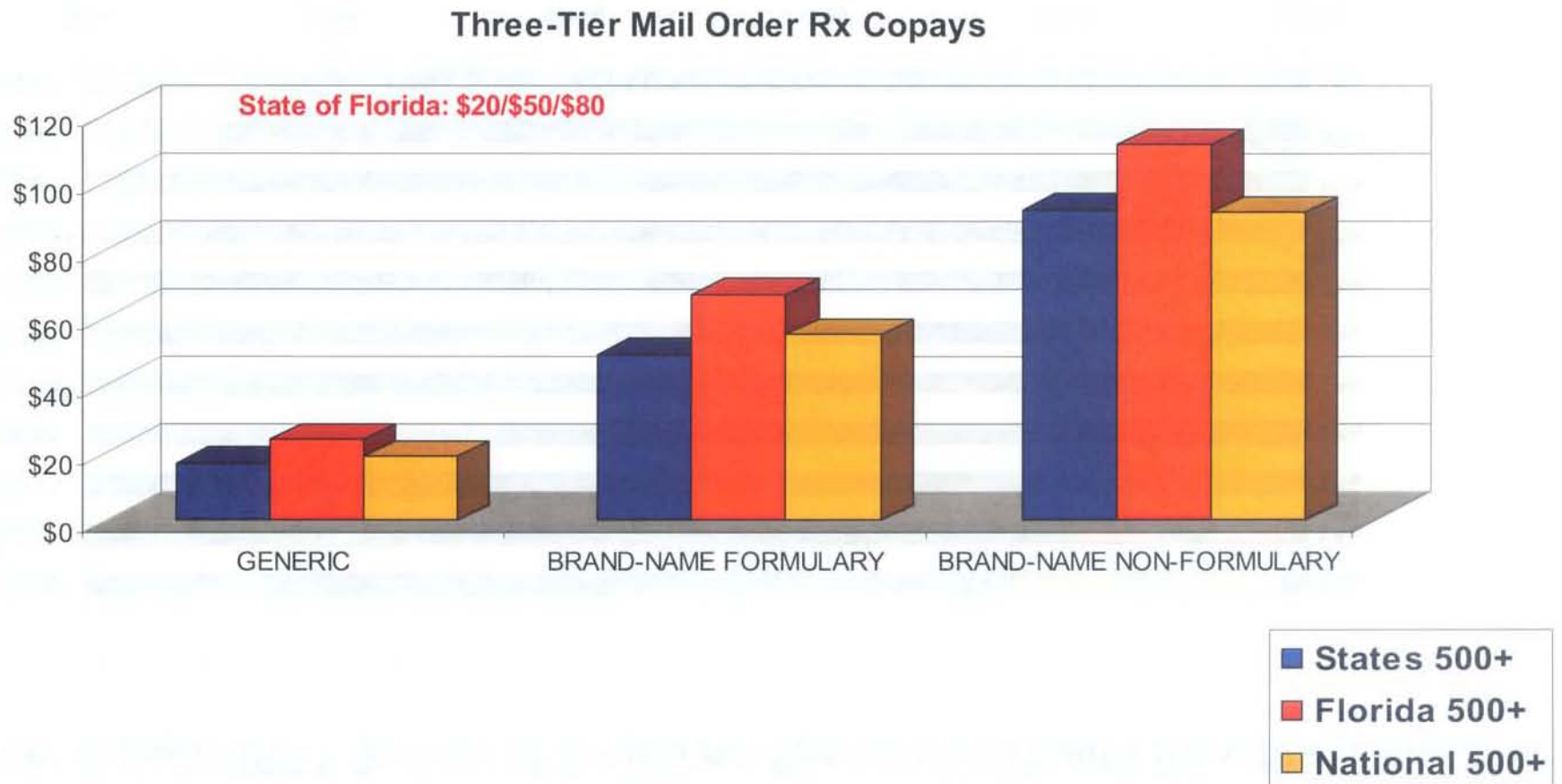

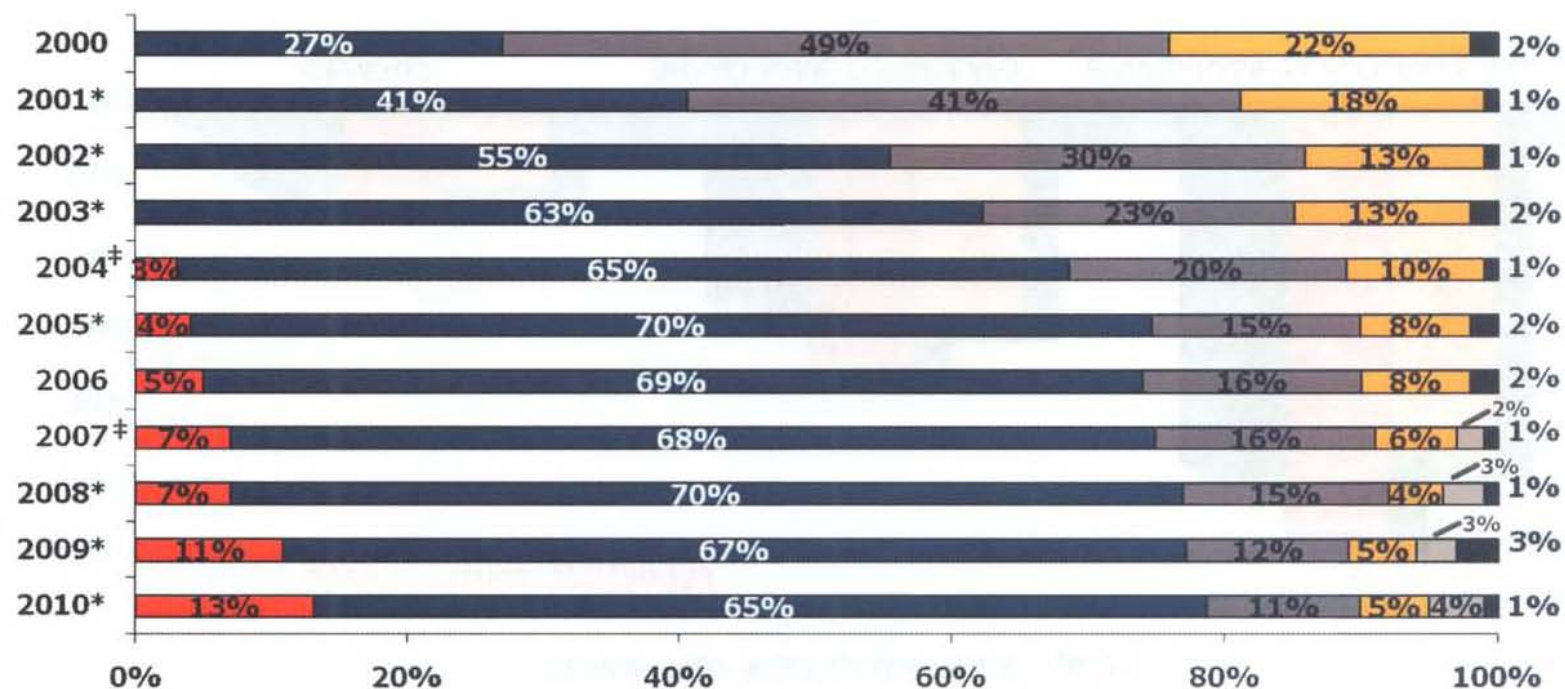


2010 PPO Benchmarks vs. 2010 Plan Prescription Drug Benefits—Mail Order



Distribution of Prescription Drug Cost Sharing Formulas

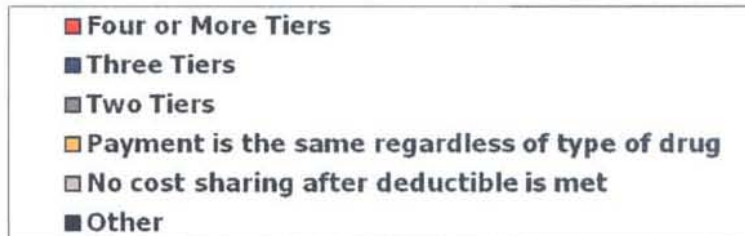
