

Between lines 110 and 111, insert:

- (3) PENALTIES .-
- (a) A physician commits a misdemeanor of the first degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082 or s. 775.083, if the physician orders low-THC cannabis for a patient without a reasonable belief that the patient is suffering from:
- 1. A serious medical condition that can be treated with low-THC cannabis; or
- 2. Symptoms of a serious medical condition that can be alleviated with low-THC cannabis.
- (b) Any person who fraudulently represents a medical condition to a physician for the purpose of being ordered low-THC cannabis by such physician commits a misdemeanor of the

I just keep wondering what the FDA clinical trials are for. This bypasses the whole process, and creates a scenario for prescribing first and researching later. If the state does want to purposely do an end-around the Feds, I think it still misses a chance to be on the forefront of cutting edge respectable research. I would think a much more legitimate scenario would be making the "registry" a research registry and everyone being treated is in the study. Asking for the Rx would mean signing up for an experimental protocol. People would pay to be a part, a true public private partnership. It also gives an endpoint and the expectation that this isn't going to mean open ended access until or unless it's a proven treatment (let's say the low THC agent is a flop, or makes people high, or has a social decline element to it just like the regular stuff--if it's still a research study you end the study and there's no moral obligation to keep the drug going for the current users; not the case so much in the bill's scenario). Purest research would mean that a subset of folks receive placebo (that's more sticky, but until and unless it is proven to be a bonafide highly effective treatment a placebo "arm" is completely ethical). A lot of the spirit of what I'm saying is in there, but as written I think it is fast and loose. I can see tons of low THC clinics popping up all over, nothing better than the pill mills everyone agrees were/are such a blight (and frankly, embarrassing as things like this perpetuates a stereotype of Florida as a haphazard lazy bottom feeder population). I already know the types of docs who'll be first in line for the 8H course. Since its low THC the idea is low euphoria and abuse potential; that is not going to stop the public from pounding down the door, money in hand, wanting to try it (we are already getting calls from people wanting Charlotte's Web, or WHICHEVER cannabis version becomes legal). Unless every qualifying diagnosis is 100% objective there will be docs fudging so people can try it out. It just sounds really seedy, pun intended. I also don't see there really being enough funding to regulate the production and dispensing everywhere all the time.

Dear Legislators:

I am a child neurologist and care for children with seizures which are resistant to many medications. These children may have multiple daily seizures which affect their development and school performance. These seizures impact quality of life and affect the whole family. The medications have side effects which affect alertness, cognition, and mood, and they may cause the child to have no appetite at all or conversely to overeat.

Cannabinoids represent a therapy which may have promise in the treatment of these children. Ongoing scientific investigation is imperative. I care for children who are not candidates for epilepsy surgery and who have tried other modalities including vagal nerve stimulator and vitamins such as pyridoxine as well as multiple anticonvulsants and who continue to have daily seizures or seizures which affect their ability to breathe independently. These children may benefit from treatment with cannabinoids. I anticipate that there will be several clinical trials in the near future to investigate this question.

Legalization of the cannabinoids would allow the families to participate in clinical trials in other states without facing prosecution for dosing the child with the medication in their home. This strategy would help keep families together. Several families have considered moving to states where the cannabinoids have been legalized. This move would take them far from their support systems and homes, but many families of children with severe epilepsy are desperate for a new therapy which may offer their child a better quality of life.

Please consider measures to legalize the cannabinoids for medical purposes in Florida so that families of children in these trials and under neurological care would not face legal sanctions for using these substances.
