



LEWIS GMAN & What Are Special Districts? There are regional districts that cover many counties and were established to create and maintain multi-county infrastructure or provide services such as the Florida Inland Navigation District and the Water Management Districts. Districts are more numerous in Florida as one moves from north to south with some North Florida counties having no more that 3 or 4 special districts and some South Florida counties such as Hillsborough having 138 districts. Section 1.01(8), Florida Statutes. Special districts are creatures of statute created by a special act of the Florida Legislature or authorized by general law. Special districts have limited purposes specified in the special act or general law that authorizes the creation of each special district. There are 1,632 active special districts in the State of Florida. See Things Differently 6



The Facts About Special Districts

Special Districts are either Independent or Dependent.

- Independent Special Districts have an independent governing board (elected or appointed), which establishes its own budget and collects taxes, assessments or fees, and spends them without oversight of city or county.
- There are 1,006 independent special districts in Florida.
- **Dependent Special Districts** functionally operate as an arm of either a city, county or state agency.
- There are 632 dependent special districts in Florida.

LEWIS ONGMAN & NALKER | P.A. See Things Differently The Facts About Special Districts Special districts have no "local home rule" power that has been granted to general purpose governments. Special districts have only the explicit authority granted by statute. Roach v. Loxahatchee Groves Water Control District, 417 So. 2d 814 (Fla. 4th DCA, 1982). A special district may only do those things explicitly authorized by the Constitution, general law or special act. Depending on it's authorizing act, a special district can levy ad valorem taxes, nonad valorem assessments, impact fees and other user fees and charges. Only those who benefit from a special district's service pay the taxes or fees. See Things Differently * 8



The Facts About Special Districts

Special Districts are Fiscally Responsible:

- Special districts are fiscally responsible governing boards that are committed to being good stewards of taxpayer dollars through responsible and lean budget decision-making. Special districts generally spend less on general and administrative expenses than other local government entities.
- Board members can be elected or appointed and generally receive little to no compensation for their public service.

Special Districts are Community-Focused:

• Special districts are community-focused and mission-critical governing boards that address specific community needs, and provide and maintain infrastructure and service needs important for area residents.


Special Districts are Accountable:


- Special districts have strong levels of accountability to protect taxpayer dollars through board members elected who are elected and appointed by voters in their community or the Governor.
- Special districts have great levels of transparency and are governed by Florida's Sunshine Laws, public records laws, and standards of ethics for elected officials.
- Special districts ensure accountability of public resources by being held to the same standard as other public bodies, such as cities, counties and other municipal governments, and are required to conduct the same annual audits of their finances.
- The electors of all 67 counties, at one time or another, have voted to allow for a special district in their community.

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

LEWIS LONGMAN & WALKER | P.A. **V 5 A T I A W** Things Differently Benefits of Special Districts Special districts provide necessary infrastructure and/or services without burdening taxpayers who do not benefit from the service/infrastructure. Special districts can help save money for affected citizens by issuing tax exempt bonds for infrastructure, purchasing tax-free essential goods and services, and receiving sovereign immunity. Members serving on governing boards have the expertise to focus on specific community needs and issues that special districts are created to address. Special districts help protect property value by assuring that roads, water and sewer lines, as well as other essential facilities and services, are functioning properly and are maintained. 


Introduction The Special District Accountability Program Summarized: Central source of uniform, up-to-date, and official information about Florida's special districts The "special district" component of the Local Government Financial Reporting System, which is a network of state and local agencies working together to collect financial and other information from all governmental entities - including special districts – for use by members of the Legislature and other officials

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Introduction A special district is: Local special-purpose government, as opposed to a general-purpose government, with jurisdiction to operate within a limited geographical area, and is created by: General Law Special Act Local Ordinance, or Rule of the Governor and Cabinet

Introduction However, a special district is <u>not</u> a: School District Community College District Seminole and Miccosukee Tribe Special Improvement District Municipal service taxing or benefit unit Board that is a political subdivision of a municipality or a part of a municipality that provides electrical service

Introduction

- Chapter 189, Florida Statutes Uniform Special District Accountability Act (the "Act") - "Umbrella law" that provides for the definition, creation, and operation of all special districts and minimum standards of accountability and transparency, such as:
 - Cooperating and coordinating with state and local agencies
 - Adopting and publishing a regular public meeting schedule
 - Adopting an annual budget

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- Spending funds only as authorized by the charter and adopted budget
- Complying with reporting requirements, (e.g., the Annual Financial Report and the Annual Financial Audit Report)

- The Act also assigns responsibilities to the Program:
 - Continuously collect, classify, update, and provide uniform special district information to state and local agencies through the Official List of Special Districts Online so they can monitor special districts, collect and compile financial and other information, and coordinate activities
 - Provide technical advisory assistance to special districts
 - Publish and continuously update *The Florida Special District Handbook Online* (collaborative effort among 15 state agencies)
 - Collect an annual fee (\$175) from each special district to pay the costs of administering the Act



- Duties and Responsibilities (Continued):
 - Ensure that special districts do not outlive their usefulness by declaring them inactive for dissolution if the special district:
 - has unanimously adopted a resolution declaring itself inactive; or,
 - has taken no action for two or more years; or,
 - has not had a governing body or a sufficient number of governing body members to constitute a quorum for two or more years; or,
 - fails to respond to an inquiry by the department within 21 days; or,
 - fails to file certain reports after receiving a certified warning / technical assistance letter; or,
 - fails to file registered office and agent information with the Program for one or more years.

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- Duties and Responsibilities (Continued):
 - State Board of Administration, Division of Bond Finance: List of special districts that did not file the Bond Information / Bond Disclosure Form and an Advance Notice of a Bond Sale
 - **Department of Management Services**, Division of Retirement: List of special districts that did not file an Actuarial Report
 - Take specific action, depending on which report is delinquent, to help the special district come into compliance with state agency requirements;
 - If necessary, enforce compliance with certain state reporting requirements




- **Example:** Failure to file the *Annual Financial Report* with the Department of Financial Services and / or the *Annual Financial Audit Report* with the Auditor General:
 - Program mails a certified technical assistance / warning letter to the special district that:
 - Explains the requirement
 - Explains how to avoid the noncompliance in the future
 - Provides a 60-day deadline to file the report
 - Explains the consequences of not filing the report
 - Requires written response if the special district is unable to file within 60-days (reason, how it will prevent a reoccurrence, estimated date it will file)


• Further Action (New):

- For special districts created by special act, the Committee, at the direction of the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, may convene:
 - A public hearing on the issue of noncompliance, and
 - A general oversight review of the special district (to make informed decisions about the district)
- For special districts created by local ordinance or resolution, the Committee may notify the county or municipality that enacted the local ordinance or resolution, which may convene:
 - A public hearing on the issue of noncompliance, and
 - A general oversight review of the special district



- Further Action (continued):
 - For all special districts, no matter how they were created, <u>and at</u> <u>the same time the public hearing and/or general oversight</u> <u>review process may be occurring</u>, the Committee may direct the Program to:
 - File a petition for enforcement in the circuit court in Leon County or,
 - Declare the special district inactive for dissolution


