

HISTORY

The Learning Alliance (TLA) can best be described as a story of hope and determination that is unfolding daily in the lives of teachers, students, and the community. What progress this community has made in 5 short years! From three parents, a philanthropist, and a superintendent with a vision, to a





To ensure student success, the Moonshot Academy for Teachers offers multiple ways to support professional development for educators.

- "Literacy off the Page" kicks off August 8th for 150 school leaders and teachers
- 100 teachers /school leaders participate in 6 Master Coach sessions after school at VBMA
- 20 Teachers receive a week of in classroom coaching at our 4 Moonshot Academy schools on the Performance Cycle
- 80 feachers receive 30 hours collaborative learning on 4 school campuses
