School Choice; Revises contributions & provisions for Florida Tax Credit Scholarship Program; revises provisions for Family Empowerment Scholarship Program, Hope Scholarship Program, virtual instruction program providers, private school requirements, & students in personalized education programs. Effective Date: July 1, 2024

Education; Revises provisions relating to New Worlds Scholarship Accounts, New Worlds Reading Initiative, & coordinated screening & progress monitoring system; provides grants to school districts to implement artificial intelligence for specified purposes; establishes specified tutoring program; & provides requirements for such program. Effective Date: July 1, 2024

HB 523 by Canady, Black, Arrington, Baker, Bankson, Basabe, Daniels, Esposito, Garcia, Gossett-Seidman, Harris, Plakon, Plasencia, Smith, Woodson (Identical SB 694)

Florida Seal of Fine Arts Program; Establishes Florida Seal of Fine Arts Program within DOE; provides purpose of program, eligibility criteria, & Commissioner of Education, DOE, & school district duties & responsibilities. Effective Date: July 1, 2024

CS/HB 7011 by State Affairs Committee, Local Administration, Federal Affairs & Special Districts Subcommittee, Persons-Mulicka (Similar SB 1052)

Inactive Special Districts; Dissolves special districts that have been declared inactive & repeals their enabling laws; provides exception to general law; dissolves Sunny Isles Reclamation & Water Control Board & repeals judicial order establishing district. Effective Date: July 1, 2024

State Affairs Committee: Favorable With Committee Substitute

CS/CS/HB 7013 by State Affairs Committee, Ways & Means Committee, Local Administration, Federal Affairs & Special Districts Subcommittee, Persons-Mulicka (Similar SB 1058)

Special Districts; Prohibits creation of new neighborhood improvement districts after date certain; provides term limits for elected members of governing bodies of independent special districts; provides method for changing boundaries of independent special district; provides additional criteria for declaring special district inactive; provides that district declared inactive may only expend funds as necessary to service outstanding debt & to comply with existing bond covenants & contractual obligations; requires independent special fire control districts to annually report training information to Division of State Fire Marshal; provides boundaries of mosquito control district may only be changed by special act; reducing maximum millage rate for mosquito control districts. Effective Date: July 1, 2024

CS/HJR 7017 by State Affairs Committee, Ways & Means Committee, Buchanan

Annual Adjustment to Homestead Exemption Value; Proposes amendment to State Constitution to require an annual adjustment for inflation to the value of current or future homestead exemptions that apply solely to levies other than school district levies & for which every person who has legal or equitable title to real estate and maintains thereon the permanent residence of the owner, or another person legally or naturally dependent upon the owner is eligible.

CS/HB 7019 by State Affairs Committee, Ways & Means Committee, Buchanan

Exemption of Homesteads; Requires value of homestead exemption be adjusted annually; requiring Legislature appropriate funds for specified purpose; require funds be distributed in specified manner; requires specified counties provide certain documentation. Effective Date: on the effective date of the amendment to the State Constitution proposed by HJR 7017 or a similar joint resolution having substantially the same specific intent and purpose

Employment and Curfew of Minors; Revises certain employment restrictions for minors 16 & 17 years of age; revises age at which employment restrictions apply; requires curfew adopted by county or municipal ordinance to include certain exceptions. Effective Date: July 1, 2024

CS/HB 303 by Regulatory Reform & Economic Development Subcommittee, Killebrew (Similar SB 334, Compare HB 261, HB 849, SB 1040, SB 1100, SB 1162)

Rabies Vaccinations; Authorizes certain persons to administer rabies vaccinations to certain animals under indirect supervision of veterinarian; defines "indirect supervision." Effective Date: July 1, 2024

Regulatory Reform & Economic Development Subcommittee: Favorable With Committee Substitute; Commerce Committee: Favorable

HB 849 by Killebrew, Buchanan, Arrington, Casello, LaMarca (Similar SB 1162, Identical SB 1040, Compare HB 261, CS/HB 303, SB 334, SB 1100)

Veterinary Practices; Authorizes licensed veterinarians to practice veterinary telehealth in accordance with specified criteria; specifies powers of Board of Veterinary Medicine related to practice of telehealth; specifies drugs veterinarian practicing telehealth may provide; provides specific authorizations for cases where patient is food-producing species; authorizes specified people to vaccinate dogs, cats, & ferrets against rabies; provides supervising veterinarian assumes responsibility for specified people who provide vaccinations. Effective Date: July 1, 2024

B. PROCEDURES:

Time allocations apply to all bills listed in Section A and any bill substituted for or taken up in lieu of a listed bill. Amendment sponsors shall have 2 minutes to open and 2 minutes to close, except as outlined below.

Except for the bills listed in Section C, the House shall spend no more than the following times:

- For each bill:
 - Questions and answers - 10 minutes
 - Debate - 5 minutes
- For each amendment:
 - Questions and answers - 5 minutes
 - Debate - 5 minutes

For all bills, along with their associated amendments, the time for questions and answers includes both the question and the answer and shall be no more than the times listed. Neither the question nor the answer shall be protracted in an attempt to use up the time.

Once more than 10 non-bill sponsor amendments are filed, the allocation of time spent on each non-bill sponsor amendment shall be determined as follows:

- 90 minutes divided by the total number of non-sponsor amendments filed.
- The time allocated for each non-bill sponsor amendment shall be divided equally between the open, questions, debate, and close.
- Amendments withdrawn prior to consideration of the bill don't count toward the total.

For the bills listed in Section C, time spent on debate shall be allocated as specified, with the time equally divided. In addition to the allotted time, the sponsor will explain and close the bill, closing not to exceed 10 minutes. After opening, the debate managers identified below (or their designee) shall be alternately recognized until their time runs out. Time not utilized is lost.

- Debate managers may speak in debate and yield time to other Members to debate; no Member may be recognized for debate unless a debate manager yields time to that Member. Recognitions of debate managers must go through the Speaker. A Member may not be recognized more than once in debate on the bill or amendment.
